SUMMER TERM AT U.O. STARTS

Many Noted Educators Listed Among Faculty Members for Annual Short Term

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 23—(Special)—Summer session of the University of Oregon at Eugene and Portland opened Monday, June 20, and indications at Eugene are that attendance here will equal that of last summer. It was stated here today by Dr. Dan E. Clark, director for the Eugene campus. Last summer the enrollment here was nearly 800.

Unusual interest is being shown in the clinical school for atypical children, to be conducted in connection with the school of education, and in art courses to be offered here. The law school is also offering for the first time this year an unusually complete schedule of courses.

Child Clinic Started—The clinical school will be in charge of Dr. Grace M. Fernald, specialist from Los Angeles, and Dr. E. W. DeBusk and Miss Lillian Raynor of the university staff. Diagnostic examinations will be given at the outset, as the school is designed for children who are hampered by certain psychological or achievement difficulties. Credit will be given for teachers taking observation work in this course.

Interest in art is centering on courses to be given by Eugene G. Steinhoff, architect from Zentral Vereinigung, Austria, who will teach "The Psychology of Art Teaching." Enrollment in the school of art will be swelled this summer by a number of educators who have been granted scholarships by the Carnegie Corporation. These scholarships provide the students with funds for tuition and materials while here. The University is the only school in the West to be selected for this work, while in the East it centers at Harvard.

Noted Faculty Members—Other noted faculty members on the Eugene and Portland staffs include M. Ellwood Smith, newly chosen director of the lower division system of the state board of higher education; Jessie Gay Van Cleve, specialist in Children's literature, American Library Association, Chicago; Ernest Sutherland Bates, writer and lecturer of New York; Wilkie Nelson Collins, writer and world-traveler; Sadie Orr-Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association; Alexander Goldenweiser, professor of thought and culture; Bernard Hinchshaw, artist of Chicago; C. R. Holloway, assistant superintendent of schools, Portland; and Charles N. Reynolds, associate professor of sociology, Stanford.

Courses in practically all schools and departments will be given here, and in Portland, and with post session which begins August 1 and lasts for four weeks, a student may take a full term's work during the summer, making in fact a year-round schedule available.

BULLETIN TELLS OF ANIMAL PESTS

Control Methods for Gophers, Squirrels and Other Rodents Told by Expert

Oregon has the reputation of being first in a great many notable achievements but one of her 'firsts' is a doubtful honor. The United States bureau of biological survey is authority for the statement that no state has a greater variety of small animal pests than Oregon and that in consequence it suffers serious crop losses unless constant effort at control of these pests is carried out.

To help the farmers in this battle the Oregon Extension service has just published a revision of a former bulletin which is entitled, "Controlling Rodent and Other Small Animal Pests in Oregon." This bulletin, by Ira N. Gabrielson, assistant federal biologist, gives concise information regarding methods of combatting the various small animal pests in this state.

Methods Are Perfected—For many years the biological survey, one of the bureaus of the U. S. department of agriculture, has been perfecting practical methods of exterminating wild animal pests and has applied such methods successfully over a wide area. Here in Oregon the county agents work in close cooperation with the survey staff and organize community campaigns using the methods of control worked out by the federal experts.

Sixteen small animal pests are considered in the revised bulletin just issued. These are ground-squirrels (Douglas, Oregon, Columbian, Plute and Townsend), black-tailed jack rabbits, pocket gophers (Willamette Valley and White-toothed), wood chuck, mountain beaver, field mice, house mice, brown rat, kangaroo rat, porcupine and Oregon mole.

Discussion of each pest includes description, distribution in Oregon, life history and habits and control methods. Copies of the bulletin may be obtained from county agents or direct from the college.
