

Pete's Belt Is At Stake Friday

Achlu and 'Wildcat' Get Main Event Positions; Reagan and Lowe Also on Card

The diamond studded Junior Welterweight wrestling championship belt will be put up as a stake for the winner in the wrestling card at the Eugene Armory Friday evening between George 'Wildcat' Pete, and Walter 'Sneeze' Achlu. Pete is the present holder of the belt and title having been in possession of it for almost a year.

The posting of the belt in this match was demanded by wrestling fans after Achlu had won the contest between the two men at the Armory last week. The victory came in the third fall when Achlu was fouled by the 'Wildcat'. The fans think that the Chinaman was not entitled to the victory and that he could not overcome Pete in another match. Other think Achlu had the best of the contest and is entitled to a chance at the belt if he is the better man. To satisfy both groups it has been decided to post the belt which was done reluctantly.

The match will be for the best two out of three falls without any time limit. As a special attraction Pat Reagan of Wyoming will meet Frank Lowe, Montana university student before the main attraction. Lowe had a place on the card last Friday and when he became dissatisfied made a speech to the spectators.

Large numbers of people were delayed in seeing the matches last week because they did not have their reservations in advance. People who are going to see the matches should try to secure their tickets in advance for their own convenience says Herb Owen, promoter.
