Necessary Regulations Outlined for Camp Parties By Health Officer

Rules for the establishment and management of safe camps in places where several persons are to congregate for any length of time were outlined this week by Dr. Frederick Striker, state health officer. The instructions are given in an effort to prevent communicable diseases from developing and spreading, and applies to water sup-

plies, living quarters, toilet facilities, and disposal of gabage. The instructions are as follows:

(a) All camps must be established upon dry, well-drained ground.





Customs Officials Told to Collect \$1.00 Per Thousand Board Feet Rough Lumber

Seattle, Wash .- Aug. 4-Information from Washington, D. C. received here by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, discloses that the United States Cultoma Bureau is directing all collectors to assess a duty of one dollar a thous and on Canadian lumber, whother rough or dressed, peeding formal and final action by officials. This action, according to the associat on, means that one dollar a thousand board feet duty will now be paid on all rough lumber formerly free coming from Canada; with the lumber ubject to an additional excise tax. as levied by the last congress of \$3.00 per thousand board feet, making total custom's charges of \$4.00 per thousand board feet.

The additional duty of \$1.00 per thousand on rough lumber to be imposed by this Custom's bureau order, is in retaliation of the 3 per cent special excise tax on all lum ber imported from the United States announced July 13 by the Canadian government. Under the provisions of the 1930 tariff act rough lumber from Canad was listed as free because Canada admitted rough lumber from the United States without charge. 
