

BELT AT STAKE IN ARMORY MEET

Reynolds Posts Welterweight Title for Go With Pete; Hill, Mackey, Others Set

Herb Owen's most ambitious wrestling card of the present season has been announced for this week, and the Eugene promoter expects to draw fans for this performance from many parts of the state.

Topping the Friday night card, which is to be the first held in the Armory since the matches were moved to the fairgrounds early in the summer, will be the match between George "Wildcat" Pete and Jack Reynolds, world's Welterweight wrestling champion of Cincinnati, Ohio. Reynolds will post his belt for this match and Pete is anxious to annex this to the one he now holds. The Wildcat is now the junior middleweight champion. He will have to reduce his weight to 147 pounds to be eligible in the welterweight class.

The special 45 minute event will be staged between Don Hill, of Wichita, Kansas, and Cyclone Mackey of Galveston, Texas.

A 30-minute opening event between Bennie Wilson, who became so ambitious last week at the fairgrounds that he challenged Pete after his match, and Pat Reagan of Wyoming has been scheduled.

The main event will be for the best two out of three falls with no time limit. Regular indoor prices will prevail for this match. The tickets selling for from \$1.10 down.

CITY ARCHWAY RAZED THIS WEEK

The last steps in the removal of the old Springfield arch, erected many years ago on the old highway to welcome visitors to Springfield and the Gateway to the McKenzie country, will be completed this week and only two massive concrete posts, approximately six feet square, will stand as mute reminders of what was once considered an imposing sign of welcome.

The disposition of this arch has been a problem facing the city ever since the new bridge was opened to travel and the old one razed. Removal of the arch has been deemed necessary as the bridge on the old road has been taken out and travelers have frequently turned under the tree bordered lane leading under the arch, thinking they were on a main traveled road.

The Chamber of Commerce assumed responsibility for the removal of the arch which was erected by various local civic organizations and a committee comprising John Anderson, John Pyle and F. B. Hamlin was named to negotiate for its removal. Last week H. G. Wesby and son was authorized to begin work and now the archway has been removed from the landscape.

Agitation for the erection of another sign on or near the triangle at the west approach to the new bridge has been started here on several occasions, but nothing has come of them so far. Local businessmen feel that some marker larger and more noticeable than the highway distance markers ought to be erected across the bridge as tourists and others pass by without knowing that a city exists across the river or that they are passing by one of the greatest playgrounds areas in the United States.
