Livestock, Home Economics, and Agricultural Exhibits to Predominate Showing

Final arrangements and plans for the Lane county 4-H Fair are rapidly being made and a completed and a detailed program of events is promised September 5, by County Club Agent, R. C. Kuehner.

The Lane county 4-H Fair which is to be held at the Lane county fair grounds in Eugene September 8, 9, 10 is to be a free fair and no admission will be charged for any of the events to be scheduled.

Friday, September 9 is to be Grange Day and a special program is being arranged for the Grangers by Mrs. C. S. Calef, lecturer of the Lane County Pomona Grange. An attendance prize is being offered the Grange having the largest percentage of their membership there.

Motion pictures will be shown throughout the three days by W. V. Fuller of the Oregon State Board of Forestry.

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Holman Agent Must Resign Job

Charges Einzig is Unfit for Office—Visits Friends in Springfield Tuesday

Declaring William Einzig, \$7,000 a year state purchasing agent, must be removed, Rufus Holman, state treasurer, was a visitor in Springfield Tuesday afternoon. He not only charges Einzig with misconduct toward employees of the treasurer's office but attacks his methods of playing bidders against each other in the purchase of state supplies.

"If bids are not satisfactory when opened they should be re-advertised," declared Holman. "It's Einzig's trick to call in a low bidder and promise him the order if he goes still lower."

"I was raised to treat women with respect," said Holman, who says the "c" has no excuse for Einzig to call the treasurer's secretary a "damn liar."

Holman has "advits as to what Einzig said in the treasurer's office when Holman was away and they not only appear to be used profanely but also the lie around."

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LOCAL POLITICS SMOULDER HERE

Rumors of Complete New Ticket for City Offices Are Heard This Week

ONLY TWO ENTER FIELD
Candidates Have One Month from Today in Which to File Nominations

City politics seemingly are smouldering here this week with the possibility of unexpected announcements being made soon of candidates for various local political positions.

Just four weeks from today remain in which to file nominating petitions, which must be in at least 40 days before the general election which is to be held on November 8, this year.

Only two candidates have publicly announced their intentions of seeking office so far. They are W. P. Tyson and I. M. Peterson who will ask re-election as mayor and city recorder, respectively. There has been considerable talk about other tickets being entered in the field, and rumors this week have it that one such is in the process of making.

Both Tyson and Peterson have announced that they seek re-election on the basis of their acquaintance with city affairs and the gradual financial retrenchment program which they have started and would like to carry out along the lines they have been following.

There are also two councilmen to be elected for four year terms to succeed W. A. Taylor and C. F. Barber, and one to be elected for two years to fill out the unexpired portion of the term held by O. H. Jarrett who has resigned. No successor to Jarrett has been named yet by the Mayor.

Many individuals have been approached relative to becoming candidates for these positions, but none of them have openly decided to enter the race. Only one hold-over member will remain on the council this year. He is Fred Fresco who has two years left to serve.

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
