Uptorn Seen In Lumber Market

Rising Volume of Business During Next Three Months Seen by Coast Group

This week's barometer shows a healthy increase in new business coming to the industry. Orders for the seven-day period are in greater volume than any week since January 30.
An undertone of betterment has been noticeable in the West Coast lumber trade since early in August and it is now apparent that for the summer the low point in orders was reached late in July. Since the first of August the orders and unfilled orders lines have been gaining strength almost weekly. The present sharp increase in new business follows two weeks of unusual buying activity reported by the Southern Pine association at New Orleans. In previous years our Southern competitors being closer to the great markets of the middle west usually have felt a quickening of trade one or two weeks in advance of larger volume in new business being placed out here. Back of the Southern Pine trade gain is a betterment in the price of cotton, primarily, according to our information from the south, but with demand coming also from states where increases in corn, wheat and pork have added to purchasing power.
Stocks are Depleted
Experienced lumbermen antici-

pate a rising volume of West Coast lumber trade for a period of 60 to 90 days and believe considerable lumber will be bought during this time for immediate repairs and some new building and for stock replacement in retail and wholesale yards. Stocks of lumber throughout the country are at the lowest levels ever known with dealers and other distributors and industrial concerns waiting during recent months for some sign that the bottom in lumber prices had been reached.
Within the past thirty days, due to a combination of extremely low and badly broken stocks in the Douglas fir region and very low production, price increases have been made effective in the Atlantic Coast and the California cargo trades. Some item advances, due to depletion of stocks and the unwillingness of mills to operate at present low prices, have occurred in the rail trade. A similar situation exists in the Southern Pine region of low stocks and mills shutting down because of inadequate returns. Economically, both regions—Southern Pine and Douglas fir—are in stocks and low production in position to be forced into price increases. Both, however, are operating today on markets which fall to return by several dollars per thousand feet the cost of timber, labor and plant investments, so the increase in values may need to be of consequence before much more production is started. Price increases of from \$1.00 to \$4.00 per thousand board feet were reported in Southern Pine quotations today in Chicago.
