BIBLE CLASSES START MONDAY

Miss Goldie Smith Again Is Chosen Director of Religious Education in Schools

CHURCHES GIVE REPORT
Parents Consent No. 100 Per Cent Expected to Up for Instruction.

Week-day Bible school classes, the grades at the Lincoln and Brant schools will be started here Monday it was announced this week by Roland Moshier, chairman of the inter-church committee directing this work.

Miss Goldie Smith, director of the Bible study work in the local schools and at the Garden Way school for the past several years will again have charge of the classes in Springfield. She has been very successful during the past in her work, having 100 per cent enrollment in her classes in most of the grades of the lower group.

The work is not compulsory, in fact parents must approve in writing, having their children take the religious study before they are permitted to be enrolled in the classes. Misses are sent home with each child for him to have signed by his parent if they want the child to take the work.

The work is given for one period each week to each grade, the teacher coming into the individual class rooms to give the instruction which included education in mission work of the church as well as study of the Bible.

Each year the entire group of students in each class work together on one major project which is outlined by the World Friendship committee. Last year this consisted of the preparation of charts and maps for South American students. The year before that Japan and her people were the subject of the mission work.

Financing of the instruction here is handled by a committee comprising representatives from each of the Protestant churches in the city. Mr. Moshier, chairman, and Miss Alta Manning represent the Christian church, Mrs. P. J. Bartholomew, the secretary and treasurer of the committee and Willis Bertsch represent the Methodist church, and Mrs. Fred Freso and Wilfred Cooke represent the Baptist church. Each church group assumes responsibility for financing a set portion of the expense.

Oregon Set For Tamers of Bears

Perfected Three-Man Spin Expected to Provide Thrills in Hayward Field Game

Probably the hardest fought college football battle of the present season to be played on Hayward field will be seen there Saturday afternoon when Prink Callison's proteges march out on the field to face the same Santa Clara eleven which last Saturday surprised the football world by administering a 12-0 defeat to the University of California, Golden Bears.

Santa Clara has always been thought of as a small school and have never been very dangerous to Coast conference teams. This year it is different, however, as the boys from California have perfected a three-man spin among their backfield players which baffles their opponents. In carrying out the play the three backs come together and spin, then spreading out in opposite directions with their backs to the charging line of the opposing team. The deception worked last Saturday and is credited with winning the game. It is expected that the same play will be the bulwark of their offensive game here this week.

Tickets for the game sell for \$1.50 and are reserved.

PARTY MEN HEAR MOTT PLATFORM

Candidate for Congress Supports Republican Ticket He Tells Committee

James Mott, Republican candidate for congress in this district, told the central committee meeting in Eugene Saturday that he was for his ticket from top to bottom. While he is considered a progressive Republican he enunciates the original principles of the party for a protective tariff based on the difference in production cost between this country and foreign countries.

Mott is also for the resubmission of the eighteenth amendment and the immediate payment of the bonus. He said he considered the constitution of the United States the people's instrument and that no congressman had any moral right to vote to prevent the people from amending it. He said it would make no difference how the state voted in November on the wet and dry issue of repealing the state prohibition law, if elected he believed that he should listen to the voice of the voters in every state who wish to express themselves on the retention, rejection or change of the eighteenth amendment.

On the bonus Mr. Mott favors legislation similar to the Patman bill in last congress. It would redeem the veterans' adjusted service certificates with United States treasury notes which would be ultimately liquidated with the same fund as is now being set aside to pay the certificates when due in 1945. He believes that by this method no increase in taxation would be required and that the expansion of the currency this would provide and the distribution of this large sum of money among the needy, would greatly hasten the return of prosperity.

Mr. Mott, who is corporation commissioner of the state of Oregon by appointment of Governor Meier, said that he had cleared up financial rackets in Oregon which had swindled the people out of 20 millions of dollars.

HUNTER HAS UNUSUAL CAMPFIRE EXPERIENCE

WORKERS FIND FEW NON-VOTERS

Registration Lists for City Show More Than 1100 Now Ready to Cast Ballots

Very few eligible voters in Springfield's four precincts have not already registered for the general election on November 8. It has been revealed here during the past week as members of the American Legion have made a house-to-house canvass to check for non-registered persons eligible to vote.

Partially complete lists of registered voters in each precinct have been furnished the drive captains by the county clerk for use in their canvass. These lists show approximately 1150 eligible voters in this city and an additional group of almost 100 which are not included in the list.

With a population of 2400 in the entire city, and an average of 4 persons to the family, the city already has more than the average number of voters registered.

There are still some who have not signed registration cards, however, and these persons are urged to do so between now and October 8, the final date, before the November election. The cards for this can be obtained at the City Hall here any week-day and instruction in filling them out will also be given.

The special emphasis being placed on registration is the result of a determined campaign launched by W. B. Dillard, county clerk to create as large a potential vote in Lane county against the proposed moving of the University as is possible. Registering is not enough in itself however, it is equally necessary to have all these registered voters go to the polls on November 8.

Precinct captains in the Legion drive are Dr. W. N. Dow, C. A. Swarts, Oswald Olson, and J. M. Larson.

TWO CONTESTS IN CITY ELECTION

Eight Candidates Seek Six Vacancies in City Government; Five for Re-election

FILING ENDS WEDNESDAY

Lovelace Withdraws; Cross, Parker and Huntly Enter Contest on Final Day

Eight candidates seeking six offices was the final result here last night in the race for city offices following an afternoon of political activity among the various factions.

Until noon Wednesday, following the dramatic withdrawal of C. A. Lovelace from the council race, there was only one candidate in the field for each of the vacancies. Before 5 o'clock, when the filing time ended, two others, John C. Parker and M. B. Huntly had entered the race in opposition to the present administration.

The final lineup of candidates as they will appear on the ballot November 8, will be as follows:

W. E. Buell, incumbent, and John C. Parker, candidates for mayor.

W. E. Buell, present treasurer by appointment, who seeks election for a full term, no opposition.

I. M. Peterson, incumbent and unopposed candidate for re-election as recorder.

W. A. Taylor and C. F. Barber, incumbents, and M. B. Huntly, seeking election as councilmen for a four year term with two to be elected.

Jesse Cross, candidate for a two year term as councilman without opposition.

Cross will fill the vacancy on the council caused by the resignation of O. H. Jarrett some time ago.
