



West Coast Group to Discuss Campaign for Strengthening of Oreganization

Seattle, Wash. Oct. 13-A call addressed to stockholders has been issued by the West Coast Lumbermen's association, Seattle, giving notification of a meeting at 10:00 a. m. Tuesday, October 15, at the

Winthrop Hotel, Tacoma.

The principal business to come before the meeting is expected to be the report of Col. W. B. Greeley. secretary-manager, on the me ship drive and the recommenda-tions of the board of trustees to the stockholders on the basis of the members obtained. The association by vote of the stockholders late in May was given until September 1 to secure 80 per cent of the industry as members, on dues reduced from 5 and 10 cents per thousand to 1% and 3 cents with the alternative of closing the association if the 80 per cent was not attained.
