COLD CONTINUES GRIP ON COAST

Warmer Night Wednesday and Noon Temperature of 34 Brings Hope of Change

The weather continues to be the most important topic of discussion here this week on the ninth day after a frigid wind swept the entire Pacific Coast early last week and sent the mercury tumbling, far below the freezing point.

Nine days of cold weather during which the temperature hovered between six and twelve degrees above zero is alone quite some record for this part of Lane county. Coming as it did following one of the mildest winters in years during which the thermometer had often climbed to 70 degrees and during which the valley had not felt frost severe enough to kill plants outdoors prior to December 5, when it made known its presence in no uncertain terms.

Food Freezes in Shelter Just what effect the extended cold will have on food prices remains to be seen. The United States department of Agriculture sees the possibility of higher prices for fresh vegetables and produce normally received from the Sacramento valley, but which has been visited by heavy frosts and snow-falls. Indications also point to a decrease in the orange crop this season. Whether it will alter the market is not known as the crop is just now being harvested and this fruit is always available at a low price at that time.

Locally hundreds and probably thousands of bushels of potatoes and vegetables have been spoiled by the freezing weather. Family after family which had their years supply stored away in sheds or garages covered them with blankets and other materials only to find that the frost had penetrated this protection.

Much Fuel Consumed The cold snap also has its agreeable aspect. Wood dealers are doing a good business or expect to do so as the family supplies of fuel dwindle away before a constant drain made to keep homes and offices heated day and night to protect water pipes and merchandise.

Younger folk are also rejoicing in the fact that they are able to use ice skates for the first time in many years. The many bodies of still water in this vicinity are ideal for this sport now. The cold weather settled down quietly without rain or snow and the water froze into ice with a smooth clean surface.

Ice Skating Available Skating parties on the Booth-Kelly mill pond here have been held every afternoon and evening this week. Many other groups are making regular visits to nearby lakes each night. At Leaburg and further up the river where the temperature has been even colder than here have been reported to have ventured out on the ice on the lake just above the dam without accident.

So seldom is ice-skating possible in this country that when the suitable conditions came into existence none of the merchants had stocks of skates. A hurried search of second hand stores uncovered many pairs which had not been used for eight or ten years.

Days Become Warmer Indications are brighter for a release from the cold grip soon, despite the fact that the weather man has twice predicted this only to have a colder snap descend. The temperature of the past two nights has shown slight improvement here. In Eugene where the official reading was 6 degrees above zero Tuesday night it had climbed to 34 during the day and dropped back only to 10 last night.

Even the goldfish are having their troubles during this weather. Many persons with outdoor ponds have been chopping holes in the ice and removing surplus ice. Now most of the water has turned to ice and they are trying to save the fish by pouring more water into the ponds. Marion Adams has been trying to devise some means of heating his pond without harming the fish but has not succeeded yet.

Streets Take On Holiday Dress

Large Community Trees at Fourth and Main Promised; Light Strings Ready

All ornamental light posts in Springfield and almost all of the store fronts are taking on a holiday appearance this week in the form of streamers of green rope made from branches of cedar trees.

When the work is completed one star fashioned from this same material will be placed at the top of each lamp post.

The work was endorsed by the Springfield Chamber of Commerce and is being financed by the individual merchants represented by John Pyle and Seivert Jacobson. Elgin Hebert is doing the work.

Mr. Hebert has also promised to erect a large Christmas tree in the street at the intersection of Fourth and Main streets. The Mountain States Power company has offered to light the tree and suitable lights are to be provided by the Chamber of Commerce.

H.S. GIRLS HAVE CHILDREN'S PARTY

There will be toys too. Members of the Progressive 22 drill team have contributed a number of toys for the occasion and others will be furnished by the girls.

This is an annual event at the school and has become a part of the social work of the organization. They prepare baskets at Thanksgiving time and entertain the children just before Christmas.

LANDMARK RAZED IN SUNDAY FIRE

R. O. Carr Family Driven Out of Home Just Before Noon; Nothing Saved from Blaze

Another of the old Springfield landmarks ceased existence here Sunday morning about noon when fire completely razed the R. O. Carr home on West Main street between Mill and Second streets. Efforts to save anything from the house were futile.

Defective wiring is believed to have caused the fire which was not discovered in the house until the entire upper part burst into flames. Mrs. Carr attempted to telephone the fire station and did succeed in giving the alarm but was unable to give the location before communication was cut off.

J. M. Larson, standing in his service station at the corner of Second and Main streets, observed smoke which seemed to be rolling out of the chimney but thought little of it believing this to be caused by a strong fire. Later when the fire truck had arrived and a front window was broken in an attempt to secure some of the personal property it seemed that the flames shot out of all parts of the building, he said.

Insurance to the amount of \$1000 was carried on the building which was owned by Henry Stewart of Eugene, and the furnishings were also insured.

The house has stood for years as the lone residence on the west end of Main street. It was originally the property of the Joe Stewart estate and at one time had been used as a hospital where some of the present physicians of Springfield practiced their profession.

LANE CHAMBER TO MEET IN CITY

Important Problems Listed on Program for Consideration at Friday Meeting

Taxes, cougars, auto license fees, mining, and possibly a sales tax for the state are among the many topics which are sure to be brought up for discussion here Friday night when the Lane County Chamber of Commerce has its monthly dinner meeting at Taylor's hall at 8:30.

This will be the final meeting of the county organization prior to the meeting of the state legislature and will be one of the most important of the year because of the many vital subjects to be brought for discussion and endorsement or rejection, thinks E. C. Harlan, secretary of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce and also secretary of the County Chamber.

Judges Approve Short Plan The vital matter of taxation will be presented in the form of a discussion of the quarterly and monthly-tax payment plans. The county judges and commissioners at their annual meeting in Portland Tuesday went on record in support of the monthly tax payment plan. They also asked that the legislature restore the 12 percent tax penalty which was abolished in the last session and to provide for a discount if the total tax is paid when the first installment is due.

Others in this county favor the quarterly payment of taxes. Both plans are intended to make it easier for individuals to pay at least a part of the taxes when they are due and thus increase the revenue to the tax supported activities.

Cougar Bounty Issue Up The question of bounty on cougars will be presented by Mr. Harlan who was in Portland this week to confer with members of the State Game Commission. Governor Meier has indicated that he will seek the discontinuation of the bounty payments as an economy measure. It seems that the State Commission may be able to make a deal with the Biological survey department of the United States whereby trained hunters would substitute the bounty payments.

At the November meeting of the County Chamber body those present approved a plan providing for a 50 percent decrease in automobile license fees without any additional tax or personal property tax. The delegates from the various member bodies were asked to ascertain the sentiment of their constituent bodies in the support of one or another of the fee reduction plans. The delegations at the meeting here Friday night will be called on to express the sentiment of the groups which they represent thereby giving members of the legislature from this county an opportunity to ascertain the wishes of the people.

Members to Be Present Mining men from Cottage Grove and other districts of the county will be present to explain the new mineral recovery laboratory now in operation at Cottage Grove where it is now in service on Bohemian mine ores. There has been considerable discussion of a state sales tax which will be offered to the legislature as a means of reducing the heavy burden on real estate. This is expected to be presented and to invoke a lively discussion.

The dinner will be prepared by the Cooking Club of the Christian church. Earl Hill, president of the County Chamber and a member of the Lane county legislative delegation, will preside at the meeting.
