MUCH BUTTERFAT FROM LANE COWS EACH YEAR

Annual Report of District Tester Received by County Agent; Gilmore Heads List

Geo. H. Gilmore, of Junction City, had the high herd and also the two high cows in the Lane county dairy herd improvement association for the year ending October 1, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher, who has just received the annual report of Walter Steele, the tester for the association.

Eleven herds containing 457 cows were tested in the association during the year. The average number of pounds of milk produced per cow was 7,334.3 and the average number of pounds of butter fat per cow was 330.47.

Owners of herds that averaged more than 300 pounds per cow, and the herd average in pounds per year are as follows: Geo. H. Gilmore, Junction City, 435.4; Chula Vista Dairy, R. R. No. 2, Eugene, 382.71; Aage Gribskov, Junction City, 361.14; Elmer Harlow, R. R. No. 2, Eugene, 356.98; Cloverleaf Dairy, R. R. No. 2, Eugene, 338; Echo Hollow Dairy, R. R. No. 1, Eugene, 325.16; and C. A. Schooling, Junction City, 308.88.

The two high cows in the association, owned by Mr. Gilmore, produced 669.75 pounds and 635.8 pounds, respectively.
