RED CROSS USE MUCH OF SURPLUS COTTON

Many Sweaters Now Available in Pacific District; Seek All Surplus Bales. Red Cross chapters in the Pacific Area now have available 201,480 cotton sweaters for distribution to distressed boys, girls, men, and women, according to word sent out by A. L. Schafer, area manager.

The distribution of sweaters is the third step in the national Red Cross program of providing clothing to needy and destitute and completes the consumption of 500,000 bales of Farm Board cotton voted by congress last July.

Delivery New Ready Throughout the Eastern, Mid-western and Pacific Areas approximately 2,760,000 sweaters will be subject to requisition by the chapters. Delivery of sweaters will begin immediately.

Red Cross records show the government cotton was used to purchase 50,832,983 yards of cloth of varieties suitable for making dresses for girls and women, shirts and underwear for boys and men, clothing for infants, underwear for all; and to acquire 1,597,069 dozens of knit underwear and hosiery for men, women and children, and overalls, jumpers, trousers and knickers for men and boys.

The sweaters will come from factories that had not received any of the Red Cross cotton orders and will keep a number of sweater factories, which were about to close down, open for six weeks or longer.

Pacific Coast factories also have shared in orders for Red Cross garments, Mr. Schafer says. Legislation is now pending in congress to turn over to the Red Cross the remainder of 329,000 bales of cotton held by the Farm Board in order to continue the clothing relief work.

Official Says More Needed John Barton Payne, chairman of the Red Cross, testifying before the House Agriculture Committee, stated that the 500,000 bales of cotton already consumed was meeting approximately 20 per cent of the requirements for clothing among the more than 3,000,000 families reported in need of garments.

The bill by Chairman Marvin Jones, of the House Agriculture Committee, contains a clause permitting exchange of the cotton for bedding, a distribution not permitted in previous legislation. This bill has passed the house and has been sent to the senate.

VALUABLE EQUIPMENT GIVEN O. S. C. ENGINEERS A gift of further valuable equipment to the communication laboratory of the electrical engineering department at Oregon State college has just been made by the Bell Telephone Laboratories, Inc., of New York. Much of the apparatus is of such a highly technical nature that it is not commercially available even if the college had funds for its purchase.

The new equipment will be used by senior students in the communications course in electrical engineering and it will make possible many tests and experiments heretofore impossible, according to Arthur L. Albert, assistant professor, who worked with a former graduate now in the Bell laboratories in obtaining the gift. The Bell system has previously helped in building up these O. S. C. laboratories until now they rate as one of the best in the entire country.

FARM MORTGAGE IS PROBLEM NOW

Lowered Cash Farm Incomes Makes Payments of Fixed Interest Difficult

The farm mortgage situation is one of the serious economic problems confronting the country, according to a review of the agricultural situation by the Oregon State college extension service in the current agricultural situation report. Due to the sharp drop in farm income, this problem is perplexing a great many farm owners and mortgage holders in Oregon. Based on preliminary data, the Oregon cash farm income index is given at 43 percent of the 1926-1930 average. This compares with around 55 for 1931, 84 for 1930, and 109 for 1929. Most of the decline in income is due to low prices, as gross production has been fairly well maintained. The report points out that the payment of fixed charges for interest on indebtedness out of farm income is now quite a different matter than it was three or four years ago when income was much higher.

Remedial Action is Uncertain "What can be done is the question being asked far and wide. Foreclosure! Moratorium! Adjustment! Legislation! All are being discussed and acted upon more or less," the statement says.

"In several states, county farm mortgage adjustment boards have been set up through which debtors and creditors may obtain assistance in making adjustments," the report points out. "These county boards are composed of persons who are capable of supplying valuable information and suggestions to both creditors and debtors in the present emergency." The report also gives data on the amount of farm mortgage indebtedness and the percentage held by various loaning agencies, and an outline of possible legislative action by congress. Copies of the report are available from county agricultural agents.
