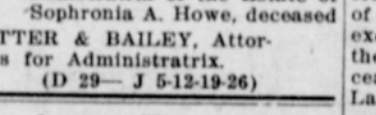

OREGON PEOPLE HEALTHY GROUP

Per Capita Cost of Education Work Less Than Half of Average for Nation

The very effectiveness of the Oregon State Board of Health in preventing any serious epidemic of contagious disease during the past many years has had the effect of creating a feeling of security among the population and at times a demand for the elimination of the Board as a useless tax eating organization, so says, a statement coming from the office of Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, health officer, this week.

The statement reads in part as follows:

"The modern health department acts as the official agency through which the community engages in such activities which will protect it from the effects of disease and which will promote the well being of its citizens. All of these activities dealing with man and his environment have these chief objectives—the promotion of health and the prevention of disease.

"The health picture in the State of Oregon has been so satisfactory that it is not surprising that those who are not informed in regard to public health work should take this opportunity to present a so-called economy measure that would cripple the disease prevention work in this state. This feeling of security is due to the fact that we have had no severe epidemics in this state for a number of years. In the presence of a severe epidemic very little effort would be needed to secure funds to protect the public, for the simple reason that the public is always ready to make a mad rush for safety in the presence of an epidemic of any fatal communicable disease. An epidemic of plague or virulent smallpox would completely paralyze the business of this state and would undoubtedly cause heavy financial losses many times in excess of the cost of prevention.

R. C. Kuehner, county club agent, plans a 4H party for Pleasant Hill district and vicinity. Four-H moving pictures will be shown after which some time will be spent on recreational work and games.
