## STLYE PROBLEMS ARE DISCUSSED BY EXPERT

Six Rules for Well Dressed Stout Woman Are Given by College Extension Worker

To be well dressed the stout woman should observe six rules, according to Mrs. Analea Sager, extension specialist in clothing, textiles and related arts...

Do not wear tight undergarments, they emphasize the curves of the figure. Be conservative, never wear extremes.

Be sure that your clothing fits well but is not tight in any part. Do not wear elaborate sleeves; they emphasize the breadth of the shoulders.

Do not emphasize any cross lines; such as a broad band across the hips. Emphasize lengthwise lines in the center front and center back of costumes.

For the slim woman, Mrs. Sager emphasized three rules, as follows. Accent the outside lines of the figure, shoulders, sleeves or hips.

Have clothing fit; too loose clothing will emphasize the thinness of the figure. Use flaring lines rather than straight lines.

Mrs. Sager pointed out that in general the bottom of the skirt, ankles and feet need study. The beginning styles of 1933, she said, "call for medium and long skirts. The longer the skirt the taller the figure appears. Long skirts also add dignity and age. Thick ankles and large feet are not so noticeable with the present styles as they were a few years ago when skirts were knee length."

In the matter of fitting dress patterns, Mrs. Sager advises extremely large and extremely small persons to find a pattern which will fit the shoulders and then alter it to conform to the bust and other body measurements before cutting the dress.

"Good style," the clothing specialist concluded, "is produced not by following the latest fad or the newest idea, but by choosing from many suggestions those that will best express the character of the individual, that will suit her face and figure, that will accent her good points and hide her less attractive ones so that she will appear as herself at her best all of the time."

# ORGANIZATION OF SCHOOL SUPPORT

"Associated Friends of Higher Education" Sought in All Parts of State

A concerted effort will be made during the month of February and the first half of March to build up a strong organization in Lane county of friends of higher education according to Mrs. Ralph Martin, chairman of the membership committee.

The purpose of the organization to be known as "Associated Friends of Higher Education" is the creation of a body of local people who are vitally interested in the continuation of higher education and who are willing to assist in defeating proposals to cripple the proper functioning of the same.

Objects of the association as set forth on the reverse side of membership cards which are being issued on payment of annual dues of 25 cents state "that the objects of the association shall be to do any and all things the organization deems necessary or advisable for the protection of higher education in the state of Oregon, and to foster and promote any and all measures, policies and activities which the organization may deem necessary or advisable for the promotion of the welfare of higher education in the state of Oregon.

It should be the further object to promote and organize similar organizations in every section of the state of Oregon to the end that there shall exist throughout the state a well-knit, active organization for the protection of higher education and the promotion of its welfare.

Individuals in each part of Lane county have been named to enroll members in the organization. H. E. Maxey has been designated for Springfield and has received register of memberships and the individual membership cards.
