NEW FARM CROPS SHOW PROMISE

State College Offers Information on Crop Change Prospects for This Season

What of the new crops, and what of possibilities for some little used ones? That farmers are always keenly interested in these matters is shown by the high proportion of inquiries dealing with new varieties and species that find their way to the Oregon Experiment station offices at Corvallis.

In the farm crops field there are several of considerable interest this year. Some are not actually new but are crops not heretofore widely used. One such is the proso type of millet which affords another re-feeding possibility for western Oregon farmers, says Harry Schoth, federal agronomist at O. S. C.

Millet is a good feed for cattle and sheep and is especially good for summer sheep pasture. It also makes excellent poultry feed. The proso millets are apparently more satisfactory than the foxtail types because they produce more heavily for both forage and seed and mature earlier, says Schoth. Forage yields have averaged more than three tons to the acre in Oregon with seed yields from 25 to 30 bushels. Early Fortune, White French, Yellow Manitoba and Hegira are satisfactory varieties.

Eastern Oregon farmers are going in strong for Crested Wheat grass as a hardy drought resistant pasture grass. Growers bought 5500 pounds of seed for fall planting and have ordered nearly as much more for spring seeding. Success of this grass in experimental trials carried on by county agents has been nearly universal.

What about the new Katahdin potato, and where can seed be obtained is a common question these days. Trials so far indicate it is a real find for western Oregon at least, its chief market drawback being that the tubers are round instead of oblong. No seed stock is available yet, says E. R. Jackman, extension specialist, as all who have it are holding it for their own use.

An extensive market for Oregon grown hairy vetch seed may develop in Oklahoma, judging from inquiries received from that state by the college. Acreage of this crop has been materially increased, particularly in Polk, Washington and Yamhill counties. A new non-shattering type of hairy vetch is being sought.

MANY ATTEND HEARING ON STATE LIQUOR BILL

One of the largest crowds of persons to attend a public hearing on a legislative act during this session gathered in the House of Representatives chamber in the state capitol Monday evening for the open consideration of two liquor modification laws now pending before the legislature according to Dr. W. H. Pollard, who with Mrs. Pollard spent the entire day visiting both houses.

The Lane county delegation was represented at the hearing by Rev. Frank S. Blestel of Eugene and P. C. Heffron, officers of the Lane county dry association. They carried with them cards of protest against the adoption of the laws which had been signed by church people in all parts of Lane county at their morning services Sunday.

Other counties of the state were also represented at the meeting. An organization meeting was held by the dry forces during the afternoon.

Dr. Pollard was extended the courtesy of the floor while visiting the senate chamber, but he says he did not avail himself of the opportunity of addressing that body of lawmakers.
