Funeral Services for Former Pastor of Methodist Congregation Held Tuesday

BUILDS CHURCH HERE

Devoted 27 Years of Life to Building Pastorates in Maine and Oregon

James T. Moore, former pastor of the Methodist church in Spring field, died at his home in Spri field Sunday following a short ill-

He was born at Scotchtown, New Brunswick, Canada on August 10, 1865 and was 67 years old at the time of his death. He married Annie Laurie Hurd in 1890 and began his life work as a preached when 24.

When 25 years old he entered the Maine conference of the Methodist church where he served six congregations. After coming to Oregon he served as pastor of five congregations before retiring.
