NEW PRESIDENT GETS RESULTS

First 15 Days of Term Bidding With Accomplishments of Chief Executive

LANE BANKS RE-OPENED

Banks Protected, Beer Expected Soon; Drastic Economy Bill Nears Goal

All Lane county banks re-opened Wednesday morning to resume normal banking activities following a bank holiday which began here March 2 on proclamation of the Governor which was extended March 5 by proclamation of President Roosevelt.

Despite the fact that there were practically no restrictions on withdrawals, more persons deposited funds on the opening day than withdrew them. The only restrictions in force now are that the bank has the right to refuse payment of currency for hoarding purposes, and is prohibited from paying out gold or gold certificates. Local checks are cashed upon presentation, and foreign or out-of-town checks are accepted for collection as deposits.

County and many school district warrants are not being cashed as funds are not available and the bankers have not yet been informed as to power to loan money on this type of security. Some action to clarify this is expected in the next week.

Unquestionably the month of March, 1933, has been the most spectacular and perhaps the most difficult one for any peace-time president. Much has taken place already and no one knows just what we might expect during the last half of the month.

Plunging into the banking situation on March 5 immediately upon assuming office President Roosevelt quickly took steps to readjust the money problem, called a special session of Congress, had a new banking law enacted, and is almost certain now of having 3.2 beer legalized, and on sale within 15 days, and of pushing thru an economy bill which will cut government expenses by one-half billion dollars.

All this has been done within 12 days since taking office, and is a record which few peace-time presidents ever acquired. His ability to do this was created largely by the urgency of the present time and a determination of the people to give him their fullest support which was reflected in Congress.

The beer legalization bill has already passed the House but was returned after passage in the Senate with amendments legalizing fruit juice drinks of the same alcoholic content. Passage of the amended bill is expected at once and 15 days after the president affixes his signature beer can be sold publicly in 13 states.

The economy bill which passed the House Saturday and the Senate last night with a number of amendments will probably be approved tonight and sent to the president for his signature.

This is one of the most startling pieces of legislation and vests in the chief executive more power than any act since the Wilsonian war days.

The bill grants to the president power to revise all pensions and compensations accruing to veterans of all wars, except the civil war, and their dependents. Pensions of civil war veterans will be cut a flat 10 per cent for one year.

The measure also empowers the executive to reduce the salary of federal, civil and military employees on a percentage basis. Senators and Representatives will receive a maximum cut of 15 percent under the measure.

DUAL MEETS PLANNED

Three Major Track Competitions Are Scheduled for Eugene This Spring

Athletic activities at Springfield high school will center about track events for the next few weeks with greater emphasis being placed on baseball the latter part of the school year, it was announced this week by Marion Hall, athletic director.

Baseball will be taken up as best as is possible with limited equipment after the track work has been organized and put under way. The school will probably not enter the "A" league competition, but will schedule games with as many nearby teams as is possible, Hall declared.

Dual track meets will be arranged with Cottage Grove, University High and Eugene high schools within the next six weeks.

Major Events Set
Three major track events will be held in Lane county this spring which will give Springfield an opportunity to compete with very little expense involved.

The events scheduled are the Willamette Valley track meet, the District "A" League elimination competition, and the State Track and Field meet. The state event will be held in Eugene on May 20. The other two events will be held on the two weeks immediately preceding this. It has not been decided yet just which event will be held first.

All of the schools which competed in the "A" league basketball, Eugene, University high, Cottage Grove, Roseburg, Springfield and possibly Junction City will be entered in the "A" league tournament. The first two schools in the number of points won in the tournament will be entered in the state meet.

More Boys Take Part

Springfield has not taken a very active part in track events in recent years, but Hall thinks he has several young men at the school this year who, with a little extensive training have great possibilities in this form of competition. Another thing which Hall points to is the fact that this activity requires the minimum outlay for equipment and at the same time opens up a field of activity for many boys who are not qualified to play football or basketball.

The first promising students which Hall has eyed are Irving Davis and Malcom Hanson, distance runners. Others include Clinton Hartman, pole vault and Everett Chetwood, shot and discus.
