Springfield Plans Trip to the South Lane City for Dual Meet at 2 O'clock

COACH GIVES ENTRY LIST

Boys Win Second Place on Hayward Field Last Week; U. H. S. Team is Third

With a total of 46 plus points Springfield's green track team stepped out on Hayward field in Eugene Saturday afternoon and won second place in the three school meet held there with University High, Cottage Grove a Springfield as the competing schools.

There was some doubt as to the exact points earned by the second and third place teams, but it was definitely decided that Cottage Grove took first with Springfield second. Cottage Grove piled up a total of 59 points.

Another track and field meet, a dual affair with Cottage Grove, to be held in the southern Lane city at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon is now receiving considerable attention from Marion Hall, coach, and his troop of athletes.

A series of these track and field meets are being held before the district elimination meet to be held in Eugene early in May at which time entries for the state meet will be chosen. This state track and field meet is to be held on Hayward field at the university, Saturday, May 20.

An address by Dr. N. H. Comish, member of the faculty at the University of Oregon, will be the feature of the program.

Another who will talk will be Dale Leslie on the "Bostonian Plan of Teaching High School Intermediate Science."

John Lund, student in the McKenzie school will be presented with the cup which he won in the Four-H marketing essay contest. The presentation will be made by E. G. Harlan, secretary of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

Beer Expected In Here Soon

New Ordinance Passes Council Wednesday; Becomes Effective Immediately

Beer in Springfield which has been given local business men who will deal in the new 3.2 beverage. There are two such dealers who have been granted licenses under the new city ordinance who are awaiting the arrival of beer. One wholesaler has also applied for and been granted a license to sell in Springfield.

The control ordinance setting a flat \$5 fee for all dealers was passed by the council last night and goes into effect immediately. It prohibits the sale of the drink between midnight and 5 A. M. It also restricts those who may obtain licenses stating that no license to sell beer within one block of a public school shall be granted. No peddler of the drink shall obtain a license, and no license shall be granted for the sale of the beverage in a dance hall or skating rink or in the same building.

Under the new ordinance it becomes unlawful to drink it in a public place which is not licensed to retail it. There shall be no screen shields to protect consumers while drinking, and any peace or police officer shall have the right to visit and inspect each of the dealer's premises.

Application for the licenses must be made to the Recorder who will notify the Police committee and they will investigate the premises and recommend the granting or refusal to grant a license to the council at their next meeting.

MOTT TO OPPOSE O. & C. REPEAL

Action Would Withdraw Near \$300,000 Federal Money from Oregon Counties

Washington, April 20—Vigorous opposition to a bill introduced in congress by Representative McClintic, Oklahoma, repealing the O. & C. Land Grants, will be voiced by Congressman James W. Mott, Oregon. It was with the idea of being better able to present his case that Mott sought and obtained a place on the Public Lands committee of the House of Representatives.

The McClintic measure has been introduced at three consecutive sessions, but its passage has not been insisted upon by McClintic. While it is believed that the measure will not come up for consideration at the special session it is certain however that it will be called up at the regular session after conference with Chairman De Rouen today. Mott stated that the bill would not likely be considered at this special session. Nevertheless, Mott is making a determined fight to kill the bill.

It is understood that McClintic is making a determined fight to have the bill brought up at this time stating that it is an economy measure. Representative Mott today indicated that he will use every method in his power to block a favorable report by the committee on the bill. He added that the measure affects nearly the entire state of Oregon and all but one of the 17 counties in his district. He intimated that the legislation was the most important bill inasmuch as it affects Oregon which will be introduced this session. The bill involves repeal of payment by the government to Oregon counties of approximately \$300,000, annually in taxes.

DIVIDEND CHECKS FOR GROVE BANK MAILED

Checks for another 10 percent dividend in both the commercial and savings departments of the Bank of Cottage Grove were placed in the mails today. The total dividend declared amounted to \$6,736.61 in both departments.

All liquidation work in connection with the closed Cottage Grove institution is being handled from Springfield in the offices of the former Commercial State bank, also in liquidation.
