Welby Stevens Out For Repeal

Three of Necessary 12 Candidates File for July Election; Two Are Wet, One Dry

Three men have indicated their desire of representing Lane county at the state repeal convention and have filed their names as candidates to be voted upon at the special election to be held July 21.

Welby Stevens of Springfield, last week announced his intention of being a candidate while in Salem attending a hop growers meeting. He filed his name with the secretary of state later in the week. He favors the repeal of the eighteenth amendment.

Hugh Earle of Eugene was the first man to file his name as a candidate. He favors repeal of the amendment from the constitution. Another man at Cottage Grove has announced his candidacy as a dry.

There are to be twelve candidates in Lane county, one for each 10,000 population. Six will favor repeal and six oppose it. The winners in the election will be bound by the pre-election stand of the majority elected, states Mr. Stevens, and will have to vote with them as a single unit.

The state convention to act on the repeal question has been set for some time in August.

Regardless of the action taken by the convention, Oregon will remain a dry state. There remains a dry clause in the state constitution which the attorney general has held cannot be voted on at this special election.

DAVID HARRILL DIES IN EUGENE

McKenzie Valley Resident Had Lived in County Since 1878, Buried Wednesday

David Thomas Harrill, resident of Lane county since 1878 died at the Pacific hospital in Eugene Monday following a short illness. He was born in Tennessee on October 7, 1866 and came to Oregon when he was 12 years old. He has lived in this county since that time, having spent the past 14 years in the Deern district.

Two brothers, Joe Harrill and Jeff Harrill, both of Leaburg, and one nephew, William Harrill, survive.

Funeral services were held from the Poole-Gray-Bartholomew chapel in Springfield Wednesday morning at 10:30. Dr. E. V. Stivers officiated and interment was made in the Greenwood cemetery at Leaburg. Over 50 Springfield young people will attend the Oregon state Christian Endeavor convention in Eugene this week-end. The first session is to open at 7:30 tonight. Dr. Perry C. Jobless Enlisting in Reforestation Service Army



Herewith is pictured the launching of the recruiting drive to enlist 250,000 unemployed for President Roosevelt's Reforestation Service plan. The enlistments are for 6 months duration for jobless between the ages of 18 and 25 years. They receive \$1 per day and the applications are passed upon by relief committees in the respective territories. One provision is that those given jobs shall assign at least three-fourths of their pay to dependents. Enlistments are made at army enlistment quarters following which those accepted are sent to army camps for conditioning after which they receive assignments by the Department of Labor. Photo No. 1 shows jobless making applications. No. 2 shows meals being served recruits from rolling army kitchens and No. 3 shows recruits off for conditioning camps.

DeEtta Sandgathe, writing at the rate of 60 words per minute with only three errors was adjudged the best typist in the group and won a three-months scholarship at the Eugene Business college.

The Lions club cup offered by the Springfield Lions club to the school making the best showing with their beginning team was won by Lorane high school for writing at the rate of 44 words per minute with seven errors. Members of the team were Reatha Runk and Beirzona Hill, Velma Severson and Miss Sandgathe comprised the Springfield amateur team. Mary Elkow and JoAnn Seavey were members of the beginning team.

Walker, Cottage Grove, Lorane and Springfield high schools—competed in the contest. F. B. Hamlin, vice president of the Springfield Lions club presented the awards.

The four members of the Springfield team will go to Corvallis Saturday with Miss Clarabel Wagner, their instructor, to compete in the state high school typing contest. They have participated in these contests for the past several years and have made very creditable showings.
