County Agent Proposes Late Grain Feed Crops

Lane Farmers Urged to Sow Late Grain Which Will Produce Heaviest Tonnage

Many Lane county farmers are wondering what they can plant late in April or during May that will make hay or other types of feed for livestock, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher.

The county agent states that there is so little difference in the feeding value of hay made from wheat, oats, or barley that Lane county farmers should sow the kind of grain from which they can get the heaviest tonnage.

Where farmers have land that can not be prepared in time for planting wheat, oats, or barley, they may plant Sudan grass, millet, or corn to good advantage.

Most people prefer Sudan grass to millet as the hay is, on the average, more palatable. Millet, however, has slightly more protein than Sudan grass, grows faster on colder land, the hay cures faster, and is probably the better of the two on Lane county land.

Summer Pastures Problem If suitable summer pastures can be provided, the hay shortage will be lessened to some extent and better milk production obtained.

Sudan grass has given excellent results as an annual pasture crop in Lane county as it has the ability to make regrowth after pasturing, or after cutting a hay crop.
