Mulligan Shows Up Strong for Springfield Team in Final Practice Session

Springfield's city baseball team will officially open the 1933 ball season for the Cascade league Sunday afternoon at Yoncalla when they meet the team from that city it was announced today by William Davis, manager for the local club. A truck has been secured to transport the players to the field and it is expected that every player turning out for the squad will be given an opportunity to make the trip which is the longest on the schedule for this season. The truck and automobiles will leave Springfield about 11 o'clock to allow ample time to reach Yoncalla before the game is called at 2 o'clock.

Schedule is Given

Westfir will come to Springfield the following Sunday, May 14 for the first home game on the Cascade league schedule. Two other games have been set for the home field, one with Dinty Moore's team from Eugene on May 21, and Junction City on May 28, before the team travels again.

Other games on the schedule include a trip to Wendling, June 4. The Fruit Growers at Springfield June 11, and Springfield at Hills Creek June 18. This will complete the first half of the schedule and June 25 the second half of the schedule will start. This will be reverse of the first half with teams playing home games on the first half, traveling.

Eight teams have been entered in the League and include the following: Fruit Growers, Junction City, Yoncalla, Wendling, Westfir, Hills Creek, Dinty's and Springfield.

The local club has had two practice games and loomed up very strong in each of them according to Davis. Wendling fell 6 to 13 in the first game, and Sunday Dinty's were defeated in a walk-away, 28 to 10 score.

Mulligan is Strong

The game was ragged at times, one player, Orval Mulligan, made an outstanding day of it for Springfield. He had a wonderful day making good three running catches from his position in center field, one being particularly spectacular when he retired the visitors with three men on bases. His own record at the batting box was also commendable. Two home runs, one time bringing in three men ahead of him, one three-base hit, and walking two times, was his record.

Mulligan spent some time in training with the San Francisco Seals and has learned much about the game from this experience.

The attendance at these games has been very pleasing. Efforts will be made to rebuild the bleachers on Brattain field before the opening home game May 14, says Davis.

Every player on the squad will be given an opportunity to participate in the Sunday game according to the manager.

HEALTH OFFICER URGES CLEAN-UP

Sanitation and Health Advantages of Campaign Are Stressed by Dr. Pollard

Everyone living within the city limits ought to gladly take advantage of the annual city cleanup drive which is being held today and tomorrow says Dr. W. H. Pollard in a statement issued just prior to the opening of the big free collection of tin cans and other refuse.

The beautification advantages in having all empty cans and other unwanted debris hauled away from the premises free of charge ought to be sufficient reason for the fullest cooperation of all residents, but the health and sanitation benefits to be derived this year far exceed all others says Dr. Pollard.

It is compulsory that all premises be kept clean to prevent disease, but the sight of empty tin cans and other containers in the back yard, usually standing half full of water during warm weather, and in which hundreds of live organisms swim and the unsightly piles of debris which flies frequently breed are also a menace to the health as well as the beauty of the city, he adds.

All refuse not wanted about the premises should be placed in boxes and sacks and placed in the alley or on the front curbing at once. City employees started this morning covering the town with a truck and are hauling away all of the material as fast as they can. Immediate action on the part of residents in placing their boxes and sacks out will assist in the cleanup by eliminating much of the doubling back on the same route which frequently is necessary says Lum F. Anderson, street commissioner who has charge of the clean-up.

MRS. MATTOON'S FUNERAL IS SET

Springfield Resident Passes Suddenly at Home; Services Are Here on Saturday

Mrs. Katherine Mattoon, 68, resident of Springfield for the past seven years was found dead at her home Wednesday afternoon at 2:30. Death was probably due to acute indigestion it was decided following an investigation made by the county coroner.

She was born in Germany on October 5, 1865 and came to the United States when six years old. She lived with her family in Michigan for several years before coming to Roseburg in 1911. They then lived in Eugene, in the East, and at Vancouver, Washington where she was married to Arthur Mattoon in 1924.

Survivors include the widower, Arthur Mattoon, one son, Donald McKinnon, who lives near Walton, two brothers and one grandchild. She was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Funeral services will be held on Saturday at 2 o'clock from the Poole-Gray-Bartholomew chapel in Springfield. Interment will be made in Laurel Grove cemetery. Rev. William G. Taylor, pastor of the Baptist church will officiate.

Miners Claim Mountain Of Gold On Winberry

Claims Staked Out for Seven Miles Around Winberry and Packsaddle Mountains

BIG GOLD RUSH NOW ON

People from Portland and Salem Among Those Going Into the Territory

A mountain of gold at Springfield's back door is claimed by miners who have staked out hundreds of claims on Winberry creek 20 miles east of here. The gold rush now going on exceeds any other preliminary activity for minerals which has taken place in Lane county. Daily people string into the territory and claims have been staked for seven miles over Winberry and Packsaddle mountains.

Two companies have been organized by groups of claim holders and one, Cascade Gold, incorporated, now has a permit to staked stock. This company, headed by W. J. Graham, plans the erection of a large mill which will handle 1000 tons a day of the ore and extract the gold. As the gold is found in soft rock it is planned to mine it with a steam shovel, run the ore through crushers and extract the pure gold by the cyanide process.

Assays taken at different places show gold running from a few cents to \$50 a ton. The samples taken out practically all show gold and miners say there are traces of gold everywhere.

If conditions are like the assays seem to indicate there are large mountains of this soft rock which contain gold in every ton. While it is low grade ore and can not be worked by hand this has not dampened the spirit of the prospectors who are daily searching over the territory. Several mining engineers and geologists have gone into the territory lately and while they say that gold is not usually found in the formation like the Winberry they admit that it is there in this case.

The forest service is building a good road into the mining territory and it will be completed in a few weeks so that cars may be driven to the mining area. Several Springfield people have visited the area lately and have been in the Cascade Gold tunnel.
