

LANE COUNCIL TO ELECT OFFICERS

Final Meeting of County P. T. A. Group to Hear Reports of Committee Heads

Annual review of the work of the past year and outlines of projects to be advanced during the next year will be discussed Saturday at the final meeting of the Lane County Council of the Parent-Teacher association. The meeting will be held at the Central Presbyterian church in Eugene starting at 11 o'clock.

Principal speakers for the meeting will be Mrs. Inez Miller, former instructor at Monmouth normal school and now studying at the University of Oregon. She will speak in the afternoon and her subject will be "What Do We Owe Our Children."

The morning session will open with a short business session at which time election of officers for the next year will be made. Springfield now has three officers on the County Council, Mrs. Pratt Holverson, program chairman; Mrs. D. C. Ogilvie, publicity chairman; and Mrs. Lee Putman, county vice-president.

Mrs. W. O. Burch, president of the Springfield P. T. A. is a member of the nominating committee of which Mrs. Warren D. Smith of Eugene is chairman.

Hot Lunch Report Due

Part of the morning session and a part of the afternoon will be given over to final reports of the different committee chairmen.

One of the most interesting of these will be the report of Mrs. Roy Woodruff, chairman of the Four-H work committee. She will report on the hot lunch plan and the manner in which it was used in various schools this year. She will also offer new suggestions and ideas which can be obtained through the extension department.

Mrs. A. L. Lamoix will report on the Study Group Activities.

Another especially interesting report will be that of Mrs. Vera Todd Crowe, chairman of the legislative committee, who will discuss the County Unit System and the new county tuition law now operative in the county.

Mrs. D. C. Ogilvie will discuss county, state and national publicity.

Mrs. H. A. Sims will talk on effective programs and how the county and local organizations should work in harmony with the state and national program.

The final report will be that of

the historian, Mrs. J. W. Working, who will exhibit her record file showing how each local should keep their records.
