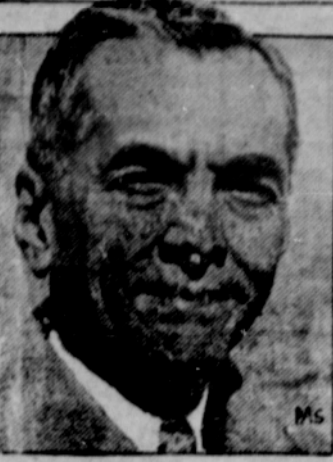

COLLEGE OFFERS FARM CROP HELP

Sunflowers Alone or With Corn Urged for Silage; Soy Beans Only Legume Left

A few weeks ago Lane farmers were advised by O. S. Fletcher, county agent, relative to late crop plantings in instances where the fall grains had been frozen. Since then farmers have not had an opportunity to work in their fields and it is now too late to plant some of the crops suggested at that time. In an effort to further aid some of these farmers, G. R. Hyslop, plant specialist at Oregon State College, has issued the following suggestions.

Soy beans, corn, sunflowers, millet Sudan grass and root crops are the remaining forage crop possibilities for planting in the various parts of Oregon where a shortage of hay and feed for the coming year is almost a certainty, says G. R. Hyslop, in charge of the plant industries division at Oregon State College.

Many Seek Assistance

Judging from the personal calls and letters to the experiment station seeking aid and advice as to late forage crops, growers fully realize the necessity for emergency planting this year to replace the normal feed crops destroyed by the cold weather of the past winter.

Soy beans are the only remaining legume crop possible in Oregon for planting at this late date, but they are usable over a considerable portion of the state. Tests have shown soy beans to be promising on warm, well drained soils of the Willamette valley. Inoculation is necessary to successful production in Oregon.

Large Sunflowers Food

Mammoth Russian sunflowers raised for silage and used with corn in the proportion of about two or three parts of sunflowers to one of corn, give an excellent silage mixture that ferments like corn and is palatable to stock, says Hyslop. The advantage of using sunflowers is that normally they will produce about twice the tonnage of corn, and this year tonnage is highly important. They are not tender to frost so can be planted earlier than corn.

Sunflowers alone and sunflowers with corn in the silo have been experimented with both east and west of the mountains, and if properly used they are of real value in the forage program, especially in an emergency year like this one, Hyslop believes. One prominent Polk county farmer has been using the corn-sunflower mixture several years for silage and finds it highly satisfactory.

Further information about these crops as well as roots, millet and Sudan grass may be obtained from any county agent.

FIRE PREVENTION BEST REFORESTATION HERE

Protection of Seedling Trees Now Growing Held More Important Than Further Plantings

Men engaged in the president's emergency conservation work will be employed largely on forest fire protective improvements in Oregon and Washington, according to forest service officials. This is said to be the best kind of reforestation here, because nature has planted millions of young trees which, if protected from fire, will give a far better forest than could be planted by hand.

This suggests an opportunity for every citizen who visits the forests this summer to help in reforestation by being careful with fire, the foresters point out. The suggestion is given significance by the annual fire report for 1932, recently compiled by the regional office at

Portland, Oregon. According to this report, there were 775 forest fires started on lands protected by the forest service in Oregon. Of these 155 were started by lightning, and the remaining 620 were man-caused. Heading the list of man-causes were: Smokers, 224; incendiary, 194; and campers, 155. The total acreage burned over by these fires amounted to 27,659 acres, and they caused damage of \$57,566. "Most of the incendiary fire damage covered by this report occurred on the Siskiyou national forest along the Redwood and Oregon coast highways. This was particularly unfortunate because it served to drive away tourist travel, and destroyed scenic beauty along these famous highways."
