WORKING OF NEW FARM LAW TOLD

Main Provisions of New Bill to Aid Agriculture Explained by O. S. C. Specialist

Economic equality for American agriculture with resultant benefits to the entire nation is the objective sought in the new farm adjustment act which is now the law of the land ly destroyed through passage by congress and the signature of President Roosevelt. Three Laws in One

The first fact found in a study of the bill is that it is really three laws in one. The first part deals with production control and benefit payment, or "farm relief" proper, and will be administered by the de partment of agriculture. The second provides for farm mortgage credits and will be handled by the Farm Credits administration; while the third deals with national currency control and will be used or not at the discretion of the president and his treasury aids.

The purpose of the main or production control section is to lessen or wipe out the present spread between the price level at which the farmer sells basic products-wheat, he uses in his business and home.

Three Methods Provided Three specific methods of accom

plishing this adjustment of production to demand, any one or all of which may be put into effect by the secretary of agriculture, are briefly as follows: First, acreage reduction of the basic agricultural commodities by actual rental and benefit payments to the farmers: second, payment of allotment benereduction; and third, the use or years of age. marketing agreements with processors and handlers in order to raise prices to the producer.
