LICENSE MATERIAL SENT TO MOTORISTS

An explanation of automobile license fees and salient points in car registration procedure are set forth in letters being sent out now to 250,000 Oregon motor vehicle owners.

A flat fee of \$5.00 for all private passenger cars for the half-year starting July 1, 1933, and subsequent annual fees of \$5.00 are matters of particular interest to motor owners this year.

Applications for licenses may be sent in at any time and plates or sheriff's temporary permits will be released by mail of at the various registration offices on June 15. All applications on file in the secretary of state's office at Salem by May 27, will be included in a drawing for low license numbers to be held on that date.

The practice of eliminating assignments of special numbers will be continued again this year.

MUSEUM OF ART TO BE OPEN AT U. O. JUNE 10

Murray Warner Art Exhibit to Get First Complete Display in New Building

The official opening of the Museum of Art at the University of Oregon campus, the massive structure which contains the famous Murray Warner collection of Oriental art, has been definitely set for alumni day, June 10. It is announced by Mrs. Gertrude Bass Warner, donor of the collection and director of the museum.

The opening has been eagerly awaited by art lovers throughout the state, who have shown great interest in the collection, which is declared to be one of the finest of oriental art in the country.

Museum is Gift

The Murray Warner collection was donated to the University of Oregon in 1920 by Mrs. Warner, in memory of her husband. Promotion of better relations between nations of the Occident and Orient, through increasing interest in arts and culture, has been Mrs. Warner's aim. Since 1920 she has devoted her time to adding to the collection, and to arranging it for the most effective display.

Mrs. Warner has aimed to represent the finest types of Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Cambodian and Mongolian art. Among the articles from Japan are lacquer, prints, paintings, embroideries, armor, guns, swords, kimonos, pewter and porcelain. Chinese articles include long roll paintings, wall paintings done on silk in delicate water colors, bronzes, pottery, furniture, jade, crystal, rose quartz and various types of jewelry, textiles and sculpture.

Building is Windowless

The museum, completed two years ago, is regarded as one of the finest museum buildings in the country. It is two stories in height and is without windows or openings of any kind except massive doors. This is because natural light and sudden changes in humidity are detrimental to the delicate objects on display in the oriental art collection. The building was declared last year as a memorial to Prince Lucien Campbell, president of the university from 1901 to his death in 1925, and it contains the Campbell memorial court.

The dedication ceremony will be held at three o'clock, and the doors will be thrown open to the public. The museum will thereafter be open daily except Monday from two to four o'clock during the month of June.
