MAYOR'S BROTHER DIES IN EUGENE

Two-Year Illness Is Fatal to Gilbert H. Tyson Monday; Funeral Held Wednesday

An illness of two years duration which made him an invalid finally claimed the life of Gilbert H. Tyson, brother of W. P. Tyson, Springfield mayor, at his home on west 22 Ave. in Eugene Monday at the age of 56 years.

Mr. Tyson was well-known in Springfield, having been auditor of the city's books for several years. He was a son of Isaac and Charlotte Tyson having been born at Chester, England on March 13, 1877. He moved with his parents to St. Servan, France in 1881 and lived there until coming to Oregon in 1894.

He was engaged in business in Fall City, Dallas and Cottage Grove for several years. Later he became associated with the University of Oregon as auditor and served in that capacity until 1931.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Nellie Hampton Tyson; one son, Alton Tyson; three brothers, Percy W. of Springfield, Alan of Eugene, and Gerald in Paris, France; and two sisters, Mrs. Ethel Gratewood in South Africa, and Miss Mabel Tyson of London, England.

He was a member of the Methodist church and of the Knights of Pythias lodge.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 3:30 from the Veatch chapel in Eugene. Rev. Cecil F. Ristow, pastor of the Methodist church, officiated, and interment was made in the Masonic cemetery.

MONTH IS CUT OFF SCHOOL YEAR

Local Board Sets Thirty-two Weeks as Maximum; More May Be Slashed If Needed

Springfield schools will not operate more than eight months next year and more may be cut off of the term if such action becomes necessary. This was the decision of the local school board announced at a special meeting Friday evening.

Members of the board feel certain that it will not be possible to operate the city schools beyond the eight month period in the 1933-34 term, but are making plans to operate them on that basis.

No action was taken on the problem of teacher salaries for the next year and no contracts have been signed with the local teachers. Last spring when the teachers were invited to retain their positions on the various faculties no salary stipulations were made with the teachers and no time limit was set on the offer extended by the board.

Members of the board did not set the dates for the next school year nor the date on which school will open next fall. It is the attitude of the board members that most of the time which will be chopped from the school year be taken off at the close of the year thereby allowing students an opportunity to assist in various spring activities.
