

LIONS PLAN FOR ANNUAL FISH FRY

Valuable Advertising and Opportunity for Local People Seen in Movement

WILL BE ON MCKENZIE

District Officers Attend Board Meeting Tuesday; To Meet in Eugene Next Week

A large trout fry to be held annually on a Sunday the latter part of June at some suitable place along the McKenzie river will be taken up as one of the major activities of the Springfield Lions club it was decided at a meeting of the board of directors and committee chairmen held at the office of Dr. W. C. Robban, Tuesday evening.

Conflicting meetings at the same time to make necessary arrangements will necessitate the holding of the first of these outdoor gatherings during July of this year. A committee will be appointed by Lion President C. F. Barber, at the next meeting to make all necessary arrangements for the fish dinner.

In opening the discussion on a fish dinner, Barber stated that he was prompted to do so by the success which greeted a previous similar dinner held here a year ago during the visit of Captain and Mrs. Frank Winch as representatives of the Gilmore Oil company.

Three-fold Purpose

The fish fry is expected to serve a three-fold purpose. First, it will be well advertised among all Lions clubs in the United States, especially those on the Pacific coast, and will be open to all who care to attend with special invitations being extended to different clubs and prominent individuals. This will provide a large community enterprise, one in which all people in the McKenzie Valley will find interest. Second, it will become one of the outstanding events to which all Willamette Valley residents and others will look forward. Third, there are always a number of prominent sportsmen traveling up and down the Pacific highway and most of these would stop and become better acquainted with the McKenzie highway and river and would become one of the best advertising mediums for this region.

Tentative plans as discussed at the Tuesday meeting would provide for each family bringing their basket dinner and for the Lions club members catching and furnishing sufficient fried fish, coffee, sugar and cream for all visitors. This would eliminate practically all preparation and actual work by committee members on the day of the fish fry.

Plan Monthly Picnics

Decision to hold one indoor noon meeting and one outdoor covered dish dinner in the evening during the next three months was reached at the meeting. The outdoor meetings will be held at some of the nearby resorts and the feature of each gathering will be a baseball game between two teams captained by the tailwaster and the Lion tamer. At the close of the season the losers of the series will provide a feed for the winners.

District Governor Ed Shea of Portland, and Past District Governors, Jack Ferris of La Grande, and W. F. Walker of Springfield, attended the meeting. The entire group adjourned to the Flenary home after the business session for refreshments and a social hour.

Next Wednesday members of the Springfield club will go to Eugene to attend the meeting of the Eugene Lions club and to hear final plans for the state convention to be held at Roseburg the same week.

Opening the main show will be concerts by two bands, an old time band and a more modern one. They will play for the grand march of the animals and performance about the circus floor.

NEW TEACHER IS HIRED

Election Board Named; Officers Advertise Wood Bids Due Before June 27

School board politics assumed new interest here yesterday with the filing of a lengthy petition nominating H. E. Maxey as candidate for director in district 19 for three years. Friends of Mr. Maxey have been urging his candidacy since it became certain that F. B. Flanery, present chairman, would not be a candidate for re-election. They circulated his petition and filed it after he consented to be a candidate.

With but one day remaining in which to file petitions for the school position, it now seems that the contest will be centered between three candidates, Clifford Wilson, first to announce his intention; Walter N. Gossler, assistant postmaster who filed recently; and Mr. Maxey.

The school election will be held on June 19 at the library, and all petitions must be filed not later than Friday evening, June 9.

No Clerk Contest Seen

Clayton F. Barber, now completing his second year as district clerk, seems to have the field to himself again this year. Mr. Barber has been without opposition during the past two years. His election being for one year whereas the director will be chosen for three years.

John F. Ketels, Sr., Frank Gordon, and Frank S. Clemo were named members of the election board by the school board members at their meeting held Monday evening.

Mrs. Rodenbough to Teach

One new teacher, Mrs. Leota Rodenbough, was employed to teach the second grade at the Bratton school next year. She will take over the work of Miss Eleanor Smith who has been transferred to the junior high at the Lincoln building for next year where she will teach the sixth grade. The inclusion of the sixth grade in the junior high school will be another innovation to be tried in the local schools next year.

The employment of Mrs. Rodenbough is the first new teacher which the local board has contracted for the next year. Three members of the faculty at the grade schools will not be present next fall, and board members do not anticipate the employment of more than the one additional instructor. They will force additional teaching work on the present instructors until the district finances improve.

Board Wants 200 Cords Wood

Wood bids for 200 cords of four-foot wood were also authorized at the Monday meeting. The board is advertising for bids during the next two weeks and will receive them not later than six o'clock on June 26. Bids are being called for both second growth split wood and slabwood. Each bidder must specify the percentage of old growth fir in his slabwood. The board will let contract for whatever amounts of each of the two kinds of wood they deem advisable up to the combined total of 200 cords.

Last year was the first time the schools used any other wood than old growth slab. The janitors at the schools reported satisfaction with the split second growth.
