

## ROSE SHOW DATE SET FOR THURSDAY

Annual Flower Exhibit to Be Held at Library; Receive Them Until 11 O'Clock

### MUST LABEL ENTRIES

Children's Parade Forms on A Street at Seventh; Marching Starts at 6 O'Clock

Springfield's annual rose and flower show sponsored by the Women's Civic Improvement club will be held Thursday, June 22, at the City Library. It was announced here this week following a final meeting of the club members to complete details for the show.

The big children's parade, always a special feature of the rose show event, will also be held on this date, and treats will be provided for the children taking part in the line of march.

All kinds of flowers, in single specimens, or in large bouquets and baskets, will be included in the showing and judging. The weather this spring has been very backward and the flowers are about one month behind previous seasons.

Only a very few rules have been adopted to govern the show this year. The most important being that each exhibit must be presented with a tag bearing the name of the flower and variety attached to it. Flowers will be received from 8 to 11 a. m. None will be received for exhibition after that time. The judging will take place at noon and the exhibit will be open to the general public immediately after the judging. Blue, red and white ribbons will be awarded the various exhibits in each classification.

The judges have not been announced but will be secured by the committee in charge.

## NEW ROUTE FOR HIGHWAY PLANNED

### State Road Body Orders Immediate Survey for Relocation South of Junction City

Announcement that the state highway commission in meeting at Portland Tuesday had authorized an immediate survey looking to the relocation of the Pacific Highway north and south of Eugene has been received here with much interest. According to the announced plans the highway will be relocated in a more straight line from Junction City to Eugene following closely the tracks of the Oregon Electric railroad.

It is the relocation of the highway south that is of major interest to residents along the route and members of the Lane-Pacific highway association who are protesting action which indicate the rerouting of the highway directly south from Eugene over the Alder street road to meet the present highway somewhere near Walker.

Another proposed survey and rerouting which would probably meet the approval of most of the residents along the highway is to raise the highway to higher ground, moving it further from the river in places and making fills in others, but following practically the same route now taken.

Howard Merrim, prominent Goshen orchardist and newly elected president of the Lane County Chamber of Commerce, attended the Portland meeting and reports that the highway commission has an opportunity to obtain some funds from the Bureau of Public Roads and the Forest Service for this work and that they expect to begin it as soon as possible.

State highway engineers, Hollis Libby and A. E. Collier, were reported to have been at Creswell Wednesday making a preliminary survey of the ground there.

## Voters Lists To Close June 25

Lane County Now Has 26,883 Registered Voters; Registrar List is Released

Registration books for the special election to be held July 21 will close on June 25. All persons who did not vote at least once during the year 1932 must re-register. All persons who have changed their residence since they registered must re-register, and persons who have recently moved into the county may register now, providing they have been in the state six months says W. B. Dillard, county clerk in charge of the registration.

Voters may register at his office or at any one of a large list of registrars in all parts of the county. Springfield people will register at the City Hall with I. M. Peterson. The federal recovery bill which is causing so much trouble in Washington this week and which prevented an early adjournment of the United States congress Saturday night, will be analyzed at the meeting by T. M. B. Hicks, Jr., new partner in the McMorrin and Washburne department store in Eugene.

Officers elected at the May meeting held in Springfield will be in charge of the gathering. Howard S. Merrim of Goshen is the new president.

## M'KENZIE PASS OPEN ON JUNE 20

Highway Group to Operate Plow on West Side With Two Shifts for 16 Hours

### C. C. C. MAKES REQUEST

Opening This Year to Be Latest in Long Time; Road Cleared June 14 in 1932

The McKenzie pass will be opened to traffic on June 20, six days earlier than had been anticipated when the snow plows were put to work June 1, it was announced Wednesday by Carl G. Washburne, member of the State Highway Commission on his return from a meeting of the highway body in Portland Tuesday.

The telegram which officials of the Civilian Conservation Corps headquarters at Eugene dispatched to the highway body at their Tuesday meeting requesting an immediate opening of the pass with snow plows working from both sides of the mountain led to an immediate check-up on the work being done and possible additional work which would speed up the opening.

### Snow Melting Fast

Communications with the snow plow crew working out of Redmond on the east side of the pass Wednesday revealed that that crew is making good progress and expect to cut through the final barrier on next Tuesday. The crew reports the snow to be melting fast on the pass at this time.

It would hardly be profitable for the highway department to send a snow plow to work on the west side under present conditions stated Mr. Washburne following a check-up of available equipment and a conference with C. C. C. officials.

### Only One Plow Available

The only rotary snow plow now available on this side of the mountains is stored at Salem. It would require three days to condition it, and by the time the plow was taken to the snow on this side and used to open the highway as far as the deep banks, the snow below would have melted of its own accord and the other plow would be almost through with its work.

As a means of cooperation and to speed up the pass opening work it is possible that two crews will alternate working with the plow now on the pass operating it at least 16 hours each day, Mr. Washburne stated.

### C. C. C. Wants Road Open

Officials of the C. C. C. headquarters in Eugene have been awaiting the opening of the McKenzie pass for several days now. They have a field camp located near Sisters and expect to use the highway to transport equipment, supplies and men to the site, also using the highway for the many frequent inspection trips which are necessary if the highway crews are successful in opening the pass on June 20, they will have completed this difficult annual task just six days later than the opening of a year ago when traffic over the pass started on June 14. The opening that year was one month later than the previous year, 1931, when the pass was opened on May 13. The unusually heavy snow fall of the past winter coupled with a hesitancy on the part of the highway commission to spend money on the opening of the pass until it was certain to be used extensively has been responsible for the delay this season.

## VALLEY SCHOOL CONTRACTS UP

### District 19 Board Makes Tentative Per-Capita Cost Proposition to Visitors

Springfield school directors in a meeting with the McKenzie high school district directors here Tuesday evening discussed a per-capita cost of educating the students of the valley district during the next school year.

No absolute proposal could be presented to the visiting directors as the cost per pupil for the past year has not been compiled; yet. This will probably be ready for the Board's consideration soon. It is expected that it will average about \$85 per pupil this year, and with proposed savings to be instituted during the next year this can be brought down to \$80 or lower.

About 20 students have been transported to the Springfield high school from the McKenzie district during the past two years. During that time the local school district here has received approximately \$1000 annually from the valley district under the Wheeler law and has made private agreements with them for the additional expense in educating the students. The Wheeler law was declared invalid during the past school year and a short term agreement between the two districts was entered into.

Another meeting of the Springfield school board will be held at the City Hall Monday evening immediately after the close of the school election polls. The directors will serve as a canvassing board for the election.

## BUS SOLDIERS AT TAKING BALKIERS TO EUGENE

Springfield's full complement of National Guard officers and men left for their annual two-weeks training period at Camp Clatsop early Tuesday morning in spite of a balky bus which was to have taken them to Eugene. The big bus which was sent here to bring the local company to the special train at Eugene broke a bearing just before it arrived at the Armory. Another bus was sent over and the men arrived late, but in time to board the special train.

The bus was towed to the repair shops in Eugene later in the afternoon.

Springfield Polls at City Hall Open 2 to 7 in Afternoon; Four Candidates

### CONTEST DIRECTORSHIP

Non-High School Districts to Cast Ballots For Five-Member School Board

Taxpayers in school district 19 which comprise all of Springfield and its immediate environs will cast their ballots at the City Hall Monday for one director to serve for three years and one clerk for one year.

Voters will have their choice between three candidates for the school director post. Clifford Wilson, Walter N. Gossler and H. E. Maxey all have been entered in the race for directorship. C. F. Barber, present clerk, is a candidate to succeed himself without opposition.

Polls will be open from 2 until 7 p. m. Monday afternoon. John F. Ketels, Sr., Frank Gordon, and Rev. Frank S. Clemo, have been named as the election board.

On the same day voters in the non-high school districts will be asked to go to their respective school houses to cast ballots for members of the Non-High School District School Board. Candidates for the positions as directors in each of the five zones have been nominated. Voters in these unorganized districts will cast their ballots for five members of the new board, and the candidate in each district receiving the highest number of votes will be elected.

Statements of qualifications and policies have been issued this week by most of the candidates setting forth their education, experience with school affairs, attitudes on various proposals, and intentions if elected to office.

The duties of the Non-High School Board shall be to organize all non-high school districts into one non-high school district, to levy a tax to defray the cost of tuition and of transportation of pupils of these unorganized districts.
