With talk of rising bread prices, producer associations to regulate the marketing of vegetables, associations to regulate the sale of meats, associations of fruit and vegetable canners, and regulation of hours and wages of lumber workers, people of Lane county are now beginning to understand the reality of the national recovery program being perfected under the direction of President Roosevelt.





Booth-Kelly to Use 120 Men Full 48-Hour Week Schedule, Period Indefinite

NO MORE MEN NEEDED

Trains Bring Many Logs to Mill Pond From Wendling **Camps During Past Week**

The Springfield plant of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company will resume operations again Monday, July 10, following a long period of idleness during which only the planers and other processing machines have been operated irregularly.

Announcement of the reopening date of Lane county's largest sawmill was made Wednesday by Charles G. Briggs, general manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company.. Mr. Briggs has been in close contact with the local mill for some time, and has been personally working together with O. H. Jarrett, superintendent of the Springfield plant, in whipping the yards, buildings and machinery into condition for the opening.






