

DRIVERS URGED TO GET LICENSE

Renewal Now Will Save Time and Money Later Says Hoss; Deadline is September 1

The realization that all drivers licenses issued before July 1, 1931, will be automatically cancelled by law on September 1 has awakened active interest in many motorists, reports Hal E. Hoss, Secretary of State. The most common question asked at his office is "What must I do to get a new license?"

Anticipating that this information will be more in demand as the expiration date on all old licenses draws near, Mr. Hoss has issued a brief formula for obtaining a new-type license.

First, the applicant must obtain the standard application blank from the Secretary of State or from local examination headquarters, state police, or sheriff's office.

Second, he must fill out the form in full and sign it in the presence of a notary public or other person authorized to administer oaths. All state examiners are notaries public and will perform this service with-

out charge.

Third, the applicant must file the completed form before September 1, either by leaving it with an examiner or by sending it to the Secretary of State at Salem. In either case, a payment of \$1 must accompany the application.

Each of the requirements are provided by law and no license can be issued unless all are complied with, it was stated.

Anti-Repeal Campaign Launched With Special Meetings in Lane County Churches

Eugene laymen supporting the retention of the Eighteenth amendment will be heard in a presentation of their arguments in Springfield next Tuesday evening, July 18, at a special prohibition rally to be held at the Christian church it was announced here today. Included in the list of speakers will be representatives from the University of Oregon, the high school, a lawyer, a doctor, and others. The three Springfield churches are cooperating in sponsoring this rally which is to start at 8 o'clock.

It is expected that Rev. Frank S. Beistel, pastor of the United Lutheran church in Eugene, will preside. Beistel is chairman of the anti-repeal organization in Lane county.

Opening guns in the campaign to close with the election July 21, were fired by the dry side last Sunday in a series of meetings held in different parts of the county.

Rev. Dean C. Poindexter, pastor of the Springfield Methodist church, was speaker at a rally of Epworth Leagues held at Creswell Sunday evening. Twenty-five members of the Springfield organization attended the meeting and assisted with the program.

Springfield Methodists will hold a symposium on the subject at their morning services Sunday with several leaders of the church as speakers.

Dry leaders are urging the church people into action, fearing that the sentiment of uselessness will cause many dry supporters to remain away from the polls and expressing their attitude.

WINBERRY GOLD CLAIM OWNERS TEST SAMPLES

Owners of gold mining claims in the Winberry district are having samples of their ore run through a test stamp mill free of charge in Eugene this week. A special test mill has been set up in the Hellig theatre building in Eugene and is being operated by H. H. Armstrong. The mill has been loaned by Cecil Woolley of Cottage Grove, who manufactures them.

There are now more than 400 claims in the Winberry district and not one of those who have brought in samples of the ore have not found gold. The gold is free milling also, says Armstrong. Considerable amounts of alloys, including mercury in large enough proportions to use as amalgam for the gold, are found in the samples run through the mill, he says.

Some of the claim samples which have been assayed have indicated as high as \$6.00 per ton of ore, while the most of them average much less, but all in paying quantities, according to Armstrong.

prices and make the purchase. Monthly bills totaling \$424.66 were presented and payment authorized.


Finances Improve
Finances of the city have shown considerable improvement during the past six months it was revealed in the audit report issued as of June 30 by C. A. Horton, auditor.

Of a total sum of \$12,197 budgeted for city purposes for the year, only \$4937.63 had been expended during the first half of the year leaving a balance of \$7259.37. That part of the tax collections for the general operating expenses of the city have not, however, equaled the amount expended at this time.

Warrant indebtedness of the city has been lowered from \$40,000 to \$29,754.06.

The city now has a total bonded indebtedness of \$136,550.56.
