BANDSMEN AND RADIO OPERATORS MAY ENLIST

There are openings for enlistment of three experienced radio operators for service in the United States according to Major Paul Hathaway, recruiting officer at Portland, Oregon. His office is in the postoffice building. Men applying, who have not had previous service in the Army must be between the ages of eighteen and thirty-five and must have a radio operators license.

Local Representatives to Be Chosen from County Group; Handle Local Organization

A meeting of wheat growers is scheduled in Taylor's Hall for Friday evening, August 25, when those who have signed applications for contracts with the government will vote for three members for their Community Committee, one of these to be a member of the County Wheat Production Control committee. The Community Committee will receive applications for contracts, check the production and acreage figures given on the applications, and secure similar figures for non-applying growers, and turn them all over to the County Control committee. This committee will then check the figures for the entire county against the average production of the county for the past five years and issue the allotments. The County committee will publish the production and acreage figures of each applicant, and the allotment he requests.
