SATURDAY BEST FOR MOTOR VEHICLE MISHAPS

Contrary to common belief, most accidents occur on Saturday and Monday rather than on Sunday, and contrary to superstitious ideas, Friday is not a bad luck day for accidents. 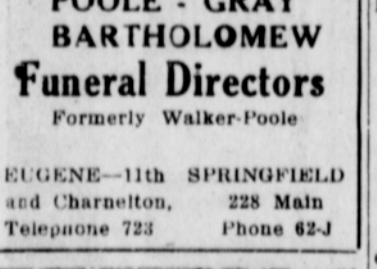
