U. S. D. A. CALLS THIRD O. S. C. SPECIALIST

Corvallis, Jan. 4.—H. P. Bars, head of the department of botany and plant pathology at Oregon State college, and for 22 years a member of the experiment station staff there, will leave Oregon early in the spring to become principal botanist in the federal experiment station staff at Washington, D. C. He will also serve as first assistant to the director of experiment stations, James T. Jardine, formerly of Oregon.

Professor Bars is widely known throughout the state for his long and effective work in directing the control of disease of Oregon farm crops. It has been under his direction that many of the successful campaigns against orchard and field crop diseases have been carried out.

This is the third time in recent weeks that the department of agriculture has reached out to take a prominent Oregon specialist from the state college staff for wider service under the federal government.

Wallace L. Kaddery, radio program director of KOAC, was placed in charge of the Western Farm and Home hour broadcast from San Francisco, next Dr. E. N. Bresman, specialist in farm crops, particularly hop breeding, was induced to join Secretary Wallace's staff as scientific adviser. All were offered substantial salary advances in addition to the broader opportunity.

SEWING MANUAL ISSUED BY EXTENSION SERVICE

At a time when many home-makers are by choice and others are by necessity turning more and more to home sewing, the O. S. C. extension service has issued a comprehensive illustrated bulletin, entitled, "A Manual for Home Sewing," by Azalea Stager, specialist in clothing and textiles.

An introduction explains that the new manual is prepared to serve three groups: Those who have little experience in home sewing but who find it economical to make the family's clothing; the more experienced who desire a ready reference handbook on home sewing, and those who are at this time under the necessity of receiving clothing materials from their federal or state government.

Subjects handled in the manual, which is free on request, include discussion of the sewing machine and other equipment, seams and seam finishes, hems and hemstitches, fabric buttonholes, pockets, plackets, bindings, pipings and folds, fastening and garment repair.

OWNERSHIP OF STILL CONTINUES AS ILLEGAL

C. C. Beebe of Coburg wins the distinction of being the first Lane county citizen to be arrested for possession of a liquor still since the repeal of the prohibition amendment. He was taken into custody Friday by federal authorities on charge of operating an unlicensed still.

He is awaiting trial in federal court at Portland.

The manufacture of liquor is not illegal under the present law, but each manufacturing unit must be licensed by the federal government.

This license costs so much that only the large-scale manufacturers find it profitable to purchase them. It is doubtful if any of the smaller still operators could qualify for a federal license either with product or quantity.
