OPERATE UNDER NRA

Import Trade Must Live Up to Code Rules

Some operations of small mills are under the impression that the minimum wage and other wage schedules of the Lumber Code do not apply to such cuttings, according to a story issued this week by the West Coast Lumbermen's assobeen reported where such operations are said to be paying wages from \$1.50 to \$2.50 for an eight-

Such owners, says the report, should be informed that the Lumber Code provides for no wages less than 421/2 cents per hour to any workman in the West Coast logging and lumber division, whether the work is done by the hour or by contract; that to pay the 421/2 cents per hour is the obligation of the owner, without regard to the selling price of his product or the market to which it is destined.

Export Lumber Controlled

In the cost protection price schedules export lumber is not included, but this fact does not in any way lessen the liability of the employer to pay code minimum and differential wages, as in Article VII of the Lumber Code. Also, the liability extends back to August 22. the date the labor provisions went into effect, for underpayments of

wages to employees. Workingmen employed in lumber mills or logging camps in the Douglas fir region who have not received minimum code wages for work done since August 22, 1933, should give all the facts to the Joint Committee on Labor, 364 Stuart Building. Seattle, Washington, in case a settlement cannot be made directly with the employer.
