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FARM DEBT COMMITTEE APPOINTED BY GOVERNOR

County Group Named to Assist in Re-Adjustment of Obligations of Farmers to Creditors

To assist worthy farmers and their creditors to work out voluntary agreements, state and county committees are being set up throughout the country. Governor Meier has appointed a farm-debt adjustment committee in every county in Oregon.

The county committees will serve under the general direction of the Oregon Agricultural Advisory Council, in cooperation with the Oregon State College Extension service.

The Lane county committee consists of E. A. McCornack, F. B. Harlow, Elmo Chase, Peter H. Peterson and Robert C. Merrill, who were nominated for appointment by the executive committee of the Agricultural council.

Must Reduce Old Debts The job of first importance which confronts this committee is to help work out debt-adjustment agreements in cases where applications for Federal Lank Bank loans have not been closed owing to an excess of old debts over the amount of new capital which can be borrowed. The number of such cases varies, ranging from a few up to 200 or more per county.

Any farmer who needs information on the procedure to be followed by the committee, or on types of farm-debt adjustment agreements, should get in touch with the county agricultural agent, O. S. Fletcher, who has a supply of application blanks upon which to register cases for consideration by the committee.

Consider All Cases The work of the committee is not limited to Federal Lank Bank cases, but will include adjustments between farmer borrowers and other mortgage creditors. The committees are without legal status, although having official recognition. Their whole function is to serve as effectively as possible on a voluntary basis, depending upon fairness for results.

Protection Stressed IN FOOD TRADE CODE Portland, Jan. 18—The average consumer of grocery and food products is amply protected in the provisions of the retail food and grocery trade code, which became effective on January 6 after approval by President Roosevelt according to C. Laird McKenna, Jr., legal advisor to the Oregon-Idaho compliance district, who examined the code today.

The retail food and grocery trade code contains a provision that no retailer of food products may increase his prices after January 6 over the prices charged for the same article on June 1, 1933 by more than is made necessary by increased costs and increased invoice or replacement costs," McKenna declared, "Any retailer found 'going' or profiteering is liable to severe penalties under the code."

Loss Leaders Out The grocery code also forbids the use of "loss leaders"—selling certain articles at less than cost to attract trade—as this practice is deemed prejudicial to labor and the farmer-producer of food products. This practice results in charging higher prices for other articles to

BUYER MUST PAY HOG TAX SAYS CO. AGENT Violations to Be Reported and Prosecution Will Be Sought Where Tax Deducted From Seller Farmers who have hogs to sell were cautioned again this week by O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, against allowing hog buyers to deduct the hog processing tax of \$1.00 per hundred pounds live weight from the price he pays for the hogs.

Mr. Fletcher quoted Henry C. Wallace, secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture in a statement in which he says that all hog buyers are expected to pay the tax which eventually is passed on to the consumer of the pork products. When the purchaser of the hogs does not pay the tax and sells at the current market prices which include the tax he is in violation of the processing act. Names of these buyers together with full particulars should be sent to Dr. A. G. Black, chief of the corn-hog section, Agricultural Adjustment Administration, Washington, D. C.

Any farmers who are in doubt about the hog processing tax can obtain full information from Mr. Fletcher at his office in the Eugene Public Market building.

O. S. C. DEAN TO BE ON REGIONAL CREDIT BOARD

Dr. W. A. Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture at Oregon State college, has accepted appointment to the board of directors of the regional office of the Farm Credit administration in Spokane. Dean Schoenfeld takes the place of Dr. E. M. Ehrhart who was recently made president of the federal land bank and thus ineligible to serve also as a director.

The regional board of directors, under the new administrative set-up, has supervision of all four of the divisions of the farm credit administration for this district. These are the federal land bank, the intermediate credit bank, the bank for cooperatives and the production credit corporation. The work as a board member will not interfere with Dean Schoenfeld's present duties at the college.

The code exempts confections sold in confectionery stores, milk products sold from house to house, bakery products sold in bakeries, and the selling of food in restaurants for consumption on the premises.

No grocery or food store operator may keep his business open less than 63 hours weekly unless fewer hours were the practice in his store prior to June 1, 1933.

NEW POSTAL RULE HITS DISTRIBUTION OF BILLS

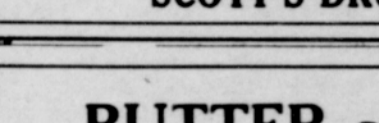
