#### FOREST SERVICE CIVES REPORT OF ACCIDENTS

Three hundred and pinety-seven non-fatal accidents occurred in the work of the U.S. forest service in Oregon and Washington during the calendar year 1933, according to report just issued by the regional office at Portland, Oregon.

Most of the injuries were caused by the men falling, slipping, lifting or pulling; the improper use of tools, and the falling of trees and other objects.

The largest number of injuries were to the hands and fingers-85 in all. Next in order are 40 foot, About 65 persons were present heel and toe injuries, followed by
