He has carried the mail on both the McKenzie and Mohawk routes, and has more than 30 years of mail carrying to his credit. MANY SIGN FOR CORN-HOG PLAN

All Applications Must Be Filed in County Agent's Office By Tuesday Next Week

A total of 37 farmers in the Springfield district turned in signed applications for participation in the corn-hog benefit program of the federal government at a meeting held here in Taylor hall Wednesday by O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

Eighteen other farmers took out blanks on which to make the application, and it is expected that at least 10 of these will sign up. The others have found it impracticable to reduce their crop acreage at this time.

All contracts must be signed and turned in at the office of Mr. Fletcher not later than April 3. After that time the temporary committee, Will White, chairman, and R. O. Rennie, and A. R. Sunderman, will make a canvass of their district to obtain production figures for the government and to ascertain if there are eligible farmers who have not entered a contract.

Records will be made of all farms where two or more sows were farrowed in the spring of 1933, by the temporary committee.

The Springfield district is one of the largest hog-producing districts in the county in number of hogs raised, says Mr. Fletcher.

No accurate estimate as to the cash benefits which farmers in this district will derive from the corn-hog plan can be made until a check is made of the number of hogs involved in the reduction program, according to Fletcher.

Sportsmen hold First Gun Shoot

Next Indoor Shoot to Be Friday Night; Rules and Regulations for Group Issued

First practice for the rifle and pistol division of the newly formed McKenzie Gateway Rod and Gun club was held Monday night at the Anderson Motors garage where a fixed target has been set up.

There were more than 25 members present for the shoot and they were divided into two teams headed by Walter Gossler and Harry Fandrem. Plans now call for the development of another target so that competing men may shoot at the same time.

The next shoot of the club will be held Friday evening and all interested in small arms shooting are invited to attend.

Every precaution to prevent accidents are being taken by the group. A set of range rules have been devised and posted for the protection of each participant. Targets are attached to a clip on an endless belt which is rolled forward from the target for inspection by means of a bicycle wheel.

Some of the rules listed by the club provide that the breech block must remain open until the person shooting is in the firing position, and as soon as the firing has been completed the breech must be opened.

Only the amount of ammunition to be used shall be placed in automatic firearms.

The person holding the gun is responsible for any accident or damage done by accidental discharge or ricochet.

Any person habitually showing carelessness or recklessness in the handling of firearms may be forbidden the use of the range.

In order to insure uniform ammunition, the club will buy the shells in large quantities, and sell them to the members. Any profit derived shall be used to pay the expenses of the range. High speed or super-power shells shall be barred from the present indoor range.

No person is to go to the target butts without first speaking to the range officers and then not until orders are issued to cease firing. At the order "cease firing" those on the range are to open the breech of their gun and keep it open until the order is given to resume firing.

All general expenses of the rifle and pistol range shall be paid for out of the profits from the sales of ammunition, and when in any month such profits are not sufficient to meet the expenses in full, the rifle and pistol teams may be assessed a fee sufficient to meet these expenses.

The play has been tentatively presented May 4 at the high school auditorium.


COUNTY TREASURER PAYS ANOTHER BOND
