WESTERN R. R. CONTINUE REDUCED RAIL FARES

The reduced passenger fares inaugurated last December by western railroads will be continued for another four months it was decided this week. Statistics indicate the reduced fares have met with favorable response from the public and, while the revenue returns have possibly not been as great as hoped for, it is the view that an extension of the experiment is warranted.

The general basis for fares is 2 cents per mile one way in coaches, 1.8 cents per mile each way for round trip in coaches, 3 cents per mile one way in sleeping cars, 2 cents per mile each way for round trip in sleepers, with ten day limit, and 28 cents per mile each way for round trip in sleepers with longer limit.

LIONS TRANSACT MUCH BUSINESS

Defer Weekly Meetings; Convention Chairman Named; Plan Election of Officers

Members of the Springfield Lions club will continue their regular meetings twice-a-month on the first and third Fridays at least during the summer and until further action is taken it was decided here Friday at the club meeting when the question of holding weekly meetings was voted on.

E. C. Stuart was named by the president as chairman of the convention committee of the local club and as such will handle details in connection with the state convention for the local club.

Officers for the next year will be chosen the first meeting in May. A nominating committee will be named at the meeting on April 20, and they will report at the next gathering.

Delegates to the state convention will not be chosen until after the new officers take over their duties it was decided. The club will be entitled to three delegates.

It is unlikely that the club will participate in the annual stunt-night program at the Convention Saturday night, June 9. Members of the local club are holding their annual fish fry somewhere on the upper McKenzie river that Saturday afternoon and will keep themselves busy with this one undertaking.

In response to suggestions members of the Lions club had offered to ladies of the Methodist church an opportunity to divide the serving of meals to the club members between the ladies of the Christian church. They investigated the situation and declined in favor of the present system which has been working very satisfactorily.

The address of the meeting was brought by Rev. Cecil F. Ristow, pastor of the First Methodist church in Eugene who spoke on "The Spiritual Price of Recovery."

WHEAT DEADLINE SET FOR SUNDAY

New Regulations for Corn-Hog Reduction Plan Received at State Office

The last chance for wheat growers to obtain contracts under the re-opening of the allotment benefit plan is April 15, the date set nationally by the wheat section of the AAA. No formal campaign for additional signers has been conducted but the offer has been open now for more than a month for those who failed to come in under the plan during the first campaign.

Oregon extension service officials have recently been notified from Washington that wheat contract holders will be able to speed up their second payment by having available all information needed in filling out "proof of compliance" blanks soon to be required by the wheat section.

Ten specific facts to be required include a record of 1933 wheat seeded and wheat harvested, 1934 acres seeded and acres abandoned, acres destroyed to comply with contract, if any; reason, if necessary, for seeding less than 54 percent of base acreage; serial numbers of other contracts if farm was entered as joint compliance, acres of wheat on other land not under contract, serial numbers of other forms under wheat contract, use of contracted acres, use of commercial fertilizer, and amount of wheat processed for home use.

Approve Oats for Pasture

An important ruling as to cropping privileges under the corn-hog contracts was received by the state college extension service just one day after the close of the sign-up campaign in this state. This ruling permits contract signers to plant oats for green feed or hay without its being counted in as feed grains, as was required under the first ruling. Such oats must be cut well in advance of ripening and will be counted in as total crop acreage, the ruling stated.

Cattle, barley, rye and flax are Oregon crops added to the basic commodity list in the farm act and hence come under the restriction against increase of acreage or basic commodities or numbers of basic livestock by corn-hog contract signers. Any increase made before the date these were added is exempted.

The corn-hog state board of review for Oregon is now organized and has started considering the contracts submitted by the various counties.

BUDGET DIRECTOR WILL STUDY O. AND C. LAW

The O. and C. land grand law amendment introduced in the house of representatives in Washington by Representative James W. Mott, has gone into committee hearing and is now being considered by Budget Director Douglas. Mr. Mott feels certain that the proposed law will be acted on favorably by the budget director.

FOREST SHOWBOAT TO VISIT OREGON SCHOOLS

The forest service lecture trucks, officially known as "showboats," which have been presenting educational forestry programs in CCC camps during the past year, will be engaged in school educational campaigns during the next five weeks, according to announcement by the regional forester, Portland, Oregon. The Oregon showboat, which is jointly in charge of W. V. Fuller, of the state forester's office, and

N. J. Penick of the forest service, will visit schools in eastern Oregon, in the territory of the Deschutes, Fremont and Malheur national forests.
