C. M. T. C. WILL ENROLL FIRST YEAR STUDENTS

Beginners or basic students will again be accepted for enrollment at Camp Hurlburt, the annual Citizen's Military Training camp at Vancouver, Washington, according to orders received.

The orders amend previous instructions, and specify that 30 per cent of the camp quotas for this summer may be basics during 1933 and up to today the camp had been limited to Red, White and Blue course men, meaning former students who had attended one or more previous camps. However, the camp quota of 228 has not been increased, but through the partial change approximately 68 newcomers will have a chance to gain admission.

Enrollment for the camp, which will open July 5 and run for the customary four weeks, is now under way at camp headquarters, and application blanks already have been mailed to former students. New applicants must be able-bodied young men between the ages of 17 and 24. They may apply directly by letter to CMTCC headquarters at Vancouver Barracks.

FOREST ROADS ARE IN POOR CONDITION NOW

The roads on the upper Willamette, Salt Creek and Salmon creek have not been worked yet this year by the forest service and are in poor condition. Slides, trees down and mud holes are the chief obstacles to travel.

No limit catches have yet been reported from the upper Willamette area. The water is high and cold and there seems to be plenty of food in the bottom of the streams. Trout are not hungry.

The road on the South Fork of the McKenzie is very rough also, and is almost impassible beyond the first five miles. A CCC sub-camp on the East Fork has been used for some time during the widening and straightening of the road, but is now closed during the shifting of the camp companies.

Farm Purchasing Power Reduced

Forecast of Crops Indicates Heavy Potato Yield; Wheat Good; Eastern Fruit Off

The purchasing power of farm commodities decreased slightly during the month ending March 15, according to the monthly agricultural situation and outlook report just released by the Oregon State college extension service. During this period the index of farm prices remained at 76 per cent of the 1910-1914 level, while the prices paid by farmers rose from 119 to 120. Hence the purchasing power of farm commodities dropped from 64 to 63 per cent of pre-war "parity."

This decrease cancels one-fourth of the 4 point gain made the month previous when the purchasing power of farm commodities rose from 60 to 64 per cent of parity. The report states that a winter wheat crop of nearly 492 million bushels is indicated by the April 1 condition of winter wheat plantings, compared with a very short crop of 351 million bushels last year. In Oregon a crop of nearly 17.5 million bushels of winter wheat is expected. The five-year average is 19.3 million bushels.

Potato growers have indicated that they intend to plant about 3.4 million acres. If yields come up to the 1928-1932 average of 112 bushels per acre, such an acreage will produce about 375 million bushels of potatoes. A crop of this size would be about 38 million bushels more than the 1933 crop and 20 million bushels above the average crop of the past five years.

Fruit prospects in eastern and northeastern United States are the poorest in many years, due to cold weather in February. Peaches and pears seem to be damaged more than apples and cherries, but all have suffered heavily.
