The report states that a winter wheat crop of nearly 492 million bushels is indicated by the April 1 condition of winter wheat plantings. compared with a very short crop of 351 million bushels last year. In Oregon a crop of nearly 17.5 mil. the position made vacant by the lion bushels of winter wheat is expected. The five-year average is 19.3 million bushels.

Potato growers have indicated that they intend to plant about 3.4 pointee of Gov. Meier. million acres. If yields come up to the 1928-1932 average of 112 bushels per acre, such an acreage will produce about 375 million bushels of potatoes. A crop of this size would be about 38 million bushels more than the 1933 crop and 20 million bushels above the
