LUMBER PRODUCTION IS STEADY FOR TWO WEEKS

Seattle, Washington, May 3- A total of 539 down and operating mills in Oregon and Washington which reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's Association for the week ending April 21, produced 99,-205.736 board feet of lumber. This was approximately the same as the preceding week. The average production of this group of sawmills in 1934 has been 87,288,326 feet; during the same period in 1933 their weekly average was 57,588,144 feet.

The new business reported last week by 579 mills was 89,470,386 board feet against a production of 98,933,784 feet and shipments of 87,-716,609 feet. Their shipments were under production by 11,3 per cent and their current sales were under production by 9.6 per cent. The ty. The unfilled order file at these mills stood at 379,081,973 board feet, a decrease of approximately 3,000,-000 feet under the week before. The aggregate inventories of 130 mills are 13.7 per cent more than at this time last year.
