

HIGHWAY WORK STARTS AT BRIDGE APPROACHES

Sidewalks, Pavement Widening, And Resurfacing Included In Local Project

A crew of men began work at the East approach of the Springfield bridge over the Willamette river doing improvement work provided for last winter in a contract signed by the Highway Commission.

Some fills have already been made and workmen are now preparing for the pouring of a concrete sidewalk from the bridge to the city sidewalk at Mill street. A curb will also be poured, the pavement widened to meet the sidewalk and a new top layer placed on the entire roadway from the bridge to Mill street.

At the East end of the city the workmen will put in sidewalks and resurface the portion of the highway which was rebuilt a few years ago when the job in the highway was removed.

Registration of all truck owners is required under the code. Farmers and others who haul their own produce exclusively are not affected by the code.

All truck operators will soon receive forms on which they will have to list a schedule of minimum charges on which they propose to operate. These minima must be above the cost of operation, including NRA labor provisions, whether the truck is owner-driven or has an employed man at the wheel, according to the code authority.
