MANY PEOPLE VISITING
NATIONAL FOREST AREAS

Camp Sites And Facilities Doubled
During Past Year By
C. C. C. Workers

A total of 34,672,125 persons en-
tered the national forests of the
United States last year, the U. S.
forest service announced today. Of
this number, over three and one-
half million visited the national for-
ests of Oregon and Washington,
which was a slight increase for this
region over the previous year, ac-
cording to C. J. Buck, regional for-
ester.

Camping in the national forests
as a whole was increasingly popu-
lar, with 2,219,904 persons taking
advantage of the constantly im-
proving public camp grounds, an
increase of 21,600 over 1932. Public
camp grounds facilities were dou-
bled in some of the forests in the
last year with the aid of the civil-
ian conservation corps, but much
of this improvement work was fin-
ished too late in the season to be-
come available last summer.

Large Areas Improved

Mr. Buck pointed out that to
June 1 of this year the camp
ground improvements completed by
the C. C. C. workers in the national
forests of Oregon and Washington
had resulted in the cleaning and
parking, of 559 acres of camp
grounds, building of 56 campers'
shelters and other public buildings,
and construction of 1,446 other
camp ground facilities such as
water and sanitary systems, fire-
places, tables, and the like for pub-
lic use on new or existing camp
grounds.

Mr. Buck said that there was an
increase over previous years of
some 45,000 motorists and other
people who visited the national for-
ests of Washington and Oregon, pri-
marily to enjoy the forest beauty.
The reports also showed a total
of 21,284,982 incidental or transient
visitors to the national forests. The
extension of highways and good
forest use roads kept the flow of
motor traffic about up to normal.

party to do much damage.

There is, however, a good deal of
money on the Republican side.
Campaign funds are going to count
heavily this year in most districts.
Here, again, the feeling in Wash-
ington is that the distribution of
immense sums of government
money in various forms of welfare
activity, such as the PWA, CWA,
CCC, FERA and the farm benefits
and bonuses will go a long way to
make voters friendly to the admin-
istration, and presumably to the
Democratic party.

Congress Faces the Voters

Doubtless all the beneficiaries of
Federal spending are grateful to
Mr. Roosevelt—but Mr. Roosevelt
is not running for re-election this
year. It is congress that has to
face the voters, and mingled with
the feeling that congress has been
nothing more than a rubber stamp
which the president used to make
his personal actions legal and con-
stitutional, is a good deal of dis-
satisfaction in many agricultural
sections; over the way some of the
recovery projects have worked out.

Farm prices in general have gone
up, but prices of goods the farmers
have to buy have gone up farther
and faster. The NRA has done a
better job in its field than has the
AAA. That has caused a lot of
dissatisfaction. Nobody yet knows
how far and how deep that kind of
dissatisfaction extends.

Busy Political Summer

The drouth has offset much if
not most of the gains for the farm-
ers as a whole—the most severe
drouth in all history, authorities
say. Probably nobody seriously will
blame the drouth on the govern-
ment, but it has beyond doubt
created an undercurrent of discon-
tent which may express itself at
the polls, in the states affected.
And if it should result in a definite
food shortage elsewhere, which
seems not at all improbable, it may
affect voters all over the country.

Then there is the great block of
inflationist voters, lineal descend-
ants of the Harrison administra-
tion and all but wrecked the Re-
publican party. Some of these are
sure to ask embarrassing questions

of their representatives as to why
they let "Wall Street" stand in the
way of monetary inflation, by
either the silver or the greenback
route, when they had the power in
their hands.
