

HOG TAX RETURN RULES EXPLAINED

Many Farmers Over-Compute Government Tax in Making Processing Returns

Due to a misunderstanding on the part of many farmers as to the exact provisions of the tax exemptions and rates as set by the government hog control program, O. S. Fletcher, county agent, has asked and received the following statement from J. W. Maloney, collector of the department of internal revenue at Portland.

"This office receives many hog processing tax returns from farmers who do not seem to have a clear understanding regarding the producer's exemption and who are entitled to the same. The revised hog regulations under the Agricultural Adjustment Act permit of an exemption to the actual producer (which means they must own the processed hog from the time of farrowing) of 300 pounds dressed weight or 396 pounds live weight, provided the total sales during the marketing year, November 5, 1933, to November 4, 1934, do not exceed 1000 pounds dressed, which, converted to live weight is 1320 pounds. A great many farmers in taking their exemption multiply 300 pounds by the rate of tax of \$0.225 and deduct \$6.75, whereas, the correct credit on 396 pounds live weight is \$8.91.

"Another much misunderstood point is the erroneous belief that every farmer who raises a hog and slaughters it for market is entitled to a producer's exemption. This is not correct, and in order to qualify they must own the processed hog from the time of farrowing. Those who buy weaner or feeder pigs and then raise them up to the time of slaughter are not entitled to the exemption.

"If any farmers come to your office for advice or instruction in connection with the preparation of their hog processing tax returns it will be appreciated if you will call these matters to their attention."

STOCK LOANS ARE AVAILABLE NOW

Farmers May Borrow Funds To Purchase Feeder Cattle From Drought Areas

Farmers and livestock operators who have adequate feed and are qualified to carry through some winter feeding may take advantage of a liberal financing program which is offered by local production credit associations of the Farm Credit administration.

Large numbers of feeder cattle and sheep are now coming into northwest stockyards from the drought areas. Production credit associations are willing to advance the full purchase price for such animals, and in some instances will also include finances for transporting feeder stock to the borrower's farm or feed lot, announced Otto F. Allgaier, secretary of the Production Credit Corporation of Spokane, which has general supervision over the northwest's 31 local cooperative credit associations, now extending a complete crop and livestock lending service to farmers.

Borrower will be permitted to make their own selection of feeders at the yards, after the proper papers through the secretary of their local production credit association. The rate of interest is but 5 per cent at the present time. Ample leeway will be granted on maturity dates so the feeder can complete his program without being crowded onto the market.

Application for such feeder loans should be made immediately to the local production credit association secretary-treasurer. Because of reduced feed supplies throughout the middlewest, the outlook for feeding appears better this year than for some time past.

Truck operators of Oregon this week elected their permanent code authority and all for hire truck operation in Oregon will shortly proceed under operating rules which this permanent code authority will apply and enforce.

Under the Trucking Code hours provided are 45 in any week and this applies whether the driver is hired or the truck is driven by its owner. The minimum wage anywhere in Oregon is 37½ cents per hour, and, again, whether the driver is hired or the truck is owner-driven, allowance for wages on that basis must be provided.
