LUMBER MARKET BELOW PRODUCTION OF MILLS Seattle, Wash., Aug. 30—A total of 553 down and operating mills in Oregon and Washington which reported to the West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending August 18 produced 96,466,213 board feet of lumber. This was approximately 1,500,000 feet under the preceding week. The average production of this group of sawmills in 1934 has been 76,916,797 feet; during the same period in 1933 their weekly average was 74,585,652 feet. The new business reported last week by 550 mills was \$2,943,955 board feet against a production of \$6,256,292 feet and shipments of 109,251,975 feet. Their shipments were over production by 13.5 percent and their current sales were under production by 12.8 percent. The orders booked last week by this group of identical mills were under the preceding week by about \$560,000 feet or approximately 10.2 percent.

MIDWEST DROUTH SENDS BARLEY PRICES UP HERE A short crop of brewing barley in the middle states has increased the demand for Oregon Hanchen barley to the point where buyers actively in the field in the Klamath Falls district have raised their offers from \$1.50 to \$1.70 a hundred in bulk at the shipping point, reports G. R. Hyslop, chief of the plant industry division, at Oregon Agricultural college. The Willamette valley and irrigated portions of Cook and Deschutes counties also produce fair amounts of this famous two-rowed barley, brought to Oregon in 1909 by the experiment station here. It was released to farmers of the state two years later after it had proved its ability to outyield all other varieties.

WHEAT CONTROL HEAD PAYS VISIT TO OREGON George E. Farrell, chief of the wheat section of the Agricultural Adjustment administration is in Oregon today conferring with officials at Oregon State college and others connected with the operation of the wheat control plan in this state. The wheat plan has been the most important among the AAA projects as far as Oregon farmers are concerned, and has been handled in an expeditious manner satisfactory to nearly all connected with it, say wheat men and extension-service officials in this state.

REMODELING LOANS FOR HOMES AVAILABLE First steps in the application of the National Housing Act which it is hoped will start a small building and remodeling boom over the entire country are now being taken by the Federal Housing Administration. Efforts are being made to organize each community to promote remodeling and repairing of privately owned homes with borrowed funds. Quantities of literature have been distributed in this city, but no active campaign has been launched here such as was started in Eugene this week. The money for improvement work about the home is made available at the banks and other institutions at a financing charge of not to exceed 45 per cent in any sum from \$100 up to \$2,000 for any period up to three years, to be repaid in monthly installments. The repayment of the funds to the banks or lending institutions is guaranteed by the government of the United States. Full details on the proper procedure in obtaining a loan are contained in pamphlets received this week, a copy of which is at the News office.

FALL TERM TO OPEN AT BUSINESS COLLEGE The Eugene Business college has just closed its summer session thus completing a successful year. The total enrollment for the year 1933-34 was 171. Fifty-four of these were in attendance at the summer session. Clarice Warner, who has been attending the McElroy Secretarial School in San Francisco, has returned and will again have charge of the shorthand, and A. E. Roberts, president and business manager, will continue as head of the bookkeeping and accounting department when the business college opens for the fall term Tuesday, September 4, in the Miner building in Eugene.

50 MINERALS DESCRIBED IN O. S. C. MINING LEAFLET Anyone in Oregon with a bent for hunting or collecting minerals may obtain free a simple aid to the identification of those to be found in Oregon. Such a guide has just been compiled by J. H. Batcheller, secretary of the Oregon State Mining board and professor of mining engineering at Oregon State college.

The mimeograph leaflet lists a simple set of equipment for use in identifying minerals, gives easily followed directions for their use and includes a key for determination of minerals. Description is included for 53 minerals, 50 of which may be found in various parts of Oregon. Several others, such as chromite, hematite and magnetite oxides are included, as it would be greatly to the advantage of the state if these should be found, says Professor Batcheller.

The leaflet is free on request, except for six cents required for postage, inasmuch as no funds have been provided the mining board for this purpose. Several federal mining publications are also available from Professor Batcheller's office, one of which deals with small scale placer mining methods. It includes maps showing placer mining districts in western states and gives detailed instructions for building simple placer mining equipment. Another circular discusses the legendary white metal and its so-called ore.
