FOOTBALL BOYS MEET REEDSPORT

Team Shows Flashes Of Brilliant Playing To Defeat Philomath On Local Field

SATURDAY GAME IS TEST

New Players Joining Squad Pleases Coach; Reserves Show Pluck On Friday

After a slow start in which they allowed the larger Philomath team to score their only touchdown the afternoon, members of the Springfield high school team lived up to punch over five touchdowns and four tries for extra points to win the game 34-6 here at Brattain field Friday afternoon. This was the first game for the Springfield team and revealed some surprising material which coach Hall has assembled for this season.

The boys in red are going to Reedspport Saturday afternoon in an attempt to duplicate their feat accomplished here. If they do they will stand out as a real threat to the teams of the district as Cottage Grove has already won one game from Reedspport by a margin of four touchdowns. Hall is planning to take a large squad to the coast city for the game.

New Player Promising

The enrollment in high school this week of Robert Claunch provided another strong addition to the team. Claunch came here from Seattle and has played football on several high school teams. He is a heavy and quick player and will probably be given a trial at the left halfback position. He is built about the same as Gooding and Goodall, a trio just a bit lighter than Chetwood, but lacking his experience.

Smith, Taylor Surprise

That the local team is not dependent on size and weight alone was demonstrated by the capable ball carrying and passing work of Disque Smith and Pete Taylor.

Chetwood, as was expected, led his team in their yardage gains and carried the ball over twice for touchdowns. Smith accounted for two more, and the Smith-Taylor combination for two.

Scott, Irvin, Williams, Cox, Posey and Cole also played a good game in the starting lineup. Most of the players on the squad, including the many freshmen were given a few minutes in the game to gain the experience.

Other new players turning out this week include Warren McKenney and Charles Ingersoll both expected to become valuable players with more experience.

Starting for the visitors was Hoyt at left half, W. J. Fallen, coaching his first year at Philomath sent the following players in at the start of the game: Wayne Byington, Shaw, Blodgett, Simmons, Vosbud, Davis, Follett, Holmes, Hoyt, Byington. Freeman Squires worked the game and Dalton Thurman was head linesman.

An interesting sidelight on the game played here Friday was the fact that in Tom Gooding, new student from South Dakota, was playing his first game of football. The strange incident is that he had never watched a game before in his lifetime, he says. He played a good game and came out without injuries.

Friday and Saturday have been designated as Forget-Me-Not days in Springfield when the small flowers will be sold for the benefit of disabled war veterans.

Mrs. C. F. Eggimann, past state department president of the Ladies of the G. A. R., has been named chairman of the drive. She will be assisted by members of Iuka circle, Lana Putman, Ha Putman, Jean Cook, and Eva Louk. Frank Stuart will handle sales in the grade schools, and Mrs. Pearl Knowler will be in charge at Wendling.

At the present time there are 53,534 disabled veterans in the United States, and only 204,791 are being cared for by the government, according to M. B. Huntly, member of the legislative committee of the disabled veterans. Dr. N. Dow is a member of the executive committee of the group.

In conjunction with the annual sale Mayor W. P. Tyson has issued the following proclamation:

"I, W. P. Tyson, mayor of the city of Springfield, Lane county, do hereby designate Friday and Saturday, October 5 and 6 as Forget-Me-Not days for the benefit of all Disabled American Veterans of the World War. It is my hearty wish that the city officials and the public in general render all possible assistance for this worthy cause, as these men gave up their health and are still suffering from their disabilities incurred in defense of their and our country. "To the people of Springfield, I wish that these two days be made a real Forget-Me-Not to show the boys that we are still with them the same as they were for us in 1917-1918."

Budget Making Will Start Soon

City Committee To Frame Estimates Monday; School Expenses To Be Set Tues.

Budget making time is here again and next week will see the preparation of the City and School district budgets. The county budget has been almost completed and will be slightly lower than last year it now seems.

The city budget will be framed Monday evening at the regular meeting of the City Council. Members of the committee to draw up the estimated expenditures for the year 1935 are W. C. Wright, F. B. Flanery, W. N. Long, O. H. Jarrett, and C. E. Wheaton together with the mayor and the City Councilmen, J. D. Pyle, Jesse Cross and W. A. Taylor.

A special budget meeting has been called by the school board to be held next Tuesday evening in the City Library. Mr. Flanery, Larson Wright, and C. F. Barber were named at the monthly board meeting last night to meet with the directors, E. C. Stuart, H. E. Maxey, and Dr. W. N. Dow, in preparing the estimate of school expenditures.

COUNTY AGENT LISTS REDUCTION BENEFITS

Lane county growers of corn and hogs who have signed production control contracts with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration of the United States Department of Agriculture will receive \$27,706 in benefit payments, less the expenses of the local association, between now and March 1 according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher, who has charge of the production control programs in Lane county. Contracts from 188 Lane County farmers were forwarded to Washington, D. C., by the county agent the first of this week. Approximately \$11,000 will be distributed during October, \$5,000 during November and the remainder about March 1 after final inspections have been made to check compliance with contracts.

FEW DAYS LEFT FOR FINAL REGISTRATION

CANDIDATE LIST FOR STATE GIVEN

Six Seek Governor Chair; Four Would Be Representative, Secretary Of State

FILINGS ARE COMPLETED

Only Three State Measures On Ballot; Lane County To Vote On Liquor Control

The names of six candidates for governor will greet voters when they obtain their ballots at the general election in November according to the official list of candidates which was prepared this week by the office of Secretary of State.

Two of the candidates, Joe E. Dunne and General Charles H. Martin, represent the Republican and Democratic parties. The other four are running as independents, having announced their political desires since the primary. These men are Harry J. Correll of Marion county, Abraham M. Silverman of Multnomah, Hank E. Wirth of Jackson county, and Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill county.

Candidates for other state offices whose names will appear on the ballot are as follows:

Representative in Congress, first district: Emmett W. Guiley, independent; James W. Mott, republican; W. S. Richards, socialist; and R. R. Turner, democrat.

Secretary of State: Earl Snell, republican; Earl C. Steward, independent; Harlan Talbert, socialist; and Horace E. Walter, democrat.

Superintendent of Public Instruction: Charles A. Howard, republican; J. W. Leonard, democrat; and Blanche H. Meyer, socialist.

Commissioner of Labor: C. H. Gram, republican; Walfred Shuholm, democrat; and Lawrence Waer, socialist.

Many Eye Legislature State legislative offices to be voted for are also highly contested in the present campaign. The candidates for these offices are as follows:

State senator, third district: C. F. Hawkins, socialist; L. L. Ray, democrat; and H. C. Wheeler, republican.

State Senator, for Linn and Lane counties, fourth district: Elwin A. McCornack, republican; Joseph Muhr, socialist; and C. A. Schooling, democrat.

Representatives fourteenth district, three to be elected: Earl Hill, C. A. Huntington, and Howard S. Merriam, republicans; Frank Carll, C. F. Hyde, and Belle Lydick, democrats; and George O. Adams, Frank Hamblen and J. G. Radabaugh, socialists.

Only three measures will appear on the ballots over the state this year. They are the grant power bill, the 20-mill tax limitation bill, and the healing arts constitutional amendment. In Lane county the voters will have to decide on two liquor proposals which will appear on the ballot, one for complete prohibition and the other for modified control.
