# SCHOOL DANCES

Directors Will Hear All Sides Of Question At Special Meeting Next Monday

ASK STUDENT CONTROL

Proponents Organize This Week; Opposition Heard; No Announcement Issued

Supporters and opponents of the plan to organize a cance club in the high school among students, Football Team who have their parents consent to dance, will be heard at a special meeting of the school board Monday evening. After the hearing the board expects to make a final decision. From the interest shown Monday night's meeting is expected to be well attended.

The original application to dance supported by 100 names on a petition from parents and other citizens asked for dancing at the high school parties. The school board has decided to submit it only for a special group, the dances to be cupervised and held separate and apart from other school activities.

On the plan under consideration attitude and members say they ex helf. pect to make their decision in accordance to what they believe is the predominant sestiment of the community. They especially want to get the viewpoint of high school students' parents.

High school students and adults sponsoring the dance movement held a meeting Tuesday evening flicted by the officials. and are perfecting an organization by which they expect to convince the board that the dances will be adequately supervised and conducted properly in accordance with

Opponents of the dance club, chiefly centered in the churches, are discussing ways and means of checking the movement. Petitions are said to have been prepared and started in circulation against high chool dancing.

In order to clarify the issue and give the students who want to dance a basis to proceed on the further games this season. school board has laid down certain minimum regulations that will be required if the dance group is permitted.
