BASIC SCIENCE EXAM IN PORTLAND, MAY 18

The next state examination in basic sciences for those intending to practice in any branch of medicine in Oregon, will be held in Portland May 18, announces Dr. Nathan Fasten, chairman of the board of higher education committee in charge of these tests. This will be the second examination since the basic science law was confirmed by a vote of the people last November. About 75 have taken the basic science examination since the law was put into effect a little more than a year ago. Dr. Fasten's records show. It is expected that ordinarily about 100 applicants a year will take it, as all those who seek licenses as doctors of medicine must pass the examination, as well as those seeking to enter other branches of the healing arts. Those planning to take the examination are required to file application with the secretary of the board of higher education, C. D. Byrne, at Eugene.

OREGON COUNTIES MAKE SURVEY OF AAA FUNDS

Federal Butter Making Control Program Planned Soon For Pacific Coast States
Every Oregon county has shared in the distribution of \$4,346,515.29 in rental and benefit payments returned to this state under the provisions of the agricultural adjustment act, according to a report as of January 1 recently received by the Oregon Extension service. Lane county's total is \$44,185.71.
Total expenditures in this state from processing taxes amounted at that time to \$10,429,466.90, but this amount included \$6,079,407.57 for "surplus removal," most of which was used in financing the wheat export subsidy at Portland. Only \$113,544.94 is listed as general administrative expense in this state.

Wheat Men Benefit Most

Wheat benefits have accounted for the bulk of AAA payments in Oregon, the total at the first of the year being \$3,880,348.65, compared with \$366,166.64 for the corn-hog program. The latter represents only the first payment on the 1934 contracts, however.
Umatilla county leads the state by a wide margin in total rental and benefit payments received Next to it: total of \$1,270,478.49 is Sherman county with \$559,540.91. Morrow, Gilliam, Wasco and Union counties follow in that order. Lincoln county farmers have profited the least directly from these payments, the total there being only \$930 so far, all from corn-hog payments.

Butter Control Next

A. H. Lauterbach, chief of the dairy section of the AAA, announced to Oregon dairymen in their state convention in McMinnville that a federal butter marketing control program will be offered to the Pacific coast states in the near future. It will be designed to accomplish much the same results being attained locally by the Oregon butter marketing agreement.
Some source of production control in the near future is deemed necessary by Lauterbach, as he says the temporary conditions that have brought about the present favorable price situation cannot be expected to continue. He also believes that dairymen are entitled to protection from "invasion" of their field by farmers using contracted acreage from other crop control programs to increase their dairy output.

SEED OF NEW POTATO AVAILABLE IN STATE

Katahdin potato seed is now available in fairly large amounts in Oregon, according to E. R. Jackman, extension agronomist at Oregon State college. This is the U. S. D. A. variety which, under test in Oregon, has proved immune to mild mosaic and resistant to other forms of mosaic diseases.
Tubers are rounded and free of knots and other second growth. They have shallow eyes, white flesh, and possess excellent cooking qualities. Western Oregon growers reported last year that the variety stayed green much longer than Burbanks, being more drought resistant. It is considered an excellent variety for use on heavy soils that tend to produce number twos of other sorts.

WILLAMETTE SWEET CLOVER FOR PASTURE

Sufficient Supply of Seed For Commercial Development is Now Available
With the completion of 10 years of successful testing through five generations of the new stem-rot resistant sweet clover, the name Willamette sweet clover has been given to this strain by its originators at Oregon State college.
From a single stalk found to have survived stem rot by Harry A. Schoth, federal agronomist at the college, seed has been multiplied until about 400 acres were sown in the spring of 1933 from which 75 acres were saved for seed last season. About 50,000 pounds of this seed has now been certified and is available for use by farmers throughout western Oregon or in other states where stem-rot is a limiting factor in the production of sweet clover.

Other States Interested

Not only are growers in this state who have tried it enthusiastic about the possibilities of this new disease-free sweet clover, but inquiries are being received at the college from many of the middle western and eastern states where stem rot has become a factor. It is expected to play a vital part in Oregon in increasing green summer pasture for dairy and other livestock and for soil building and erosion prevention purposes.
Growers in Benton, Linn, Lane, Polk and Yamhill counties particularly have found that this clover is exceptionally winter hardy and starts growth early in the spring of the second year. It provides considerable pasture the first year and through its two years of life is recognized as the best non-irrigated pasture producer now available. If proper pasturing methods are practiced, it supplies green forage throughout the summer and into early fall.

SEE GAIN IN PAST YEAR

More than 340,000 persons viewed educational moving pictures and lantern slides distributed during the past year by the visual aid library at Corvallis, according to the annual report just made by U. S. Burt, head of the department of visual instruction for the entire educational system. This was an increase of nearly 100,000 over the year previous.
The material was loaned out to schools, granges, Legion posts, parent-teacher association, CCC camps and community clubs in 35 counties and 10 other states. What is said to be the smallest service fee in the country, ranging from 10 to 25 cents a set, is the only cost aside from transportation.

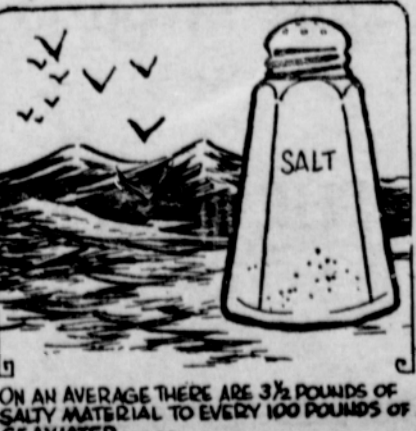
