

BIBLE STUDENTS GET HONOR ROLL

Nearly Half Of Enrolled Pupils Complete Week-day Work For First Term

REPORT BY COMMITTEE

Project Work Includes Soap Carving, Old Testament, Memory Of Psalms

Names of students on the honor roll of the Week-day Bible school for the first half of the year were released this week by Mrs. Goldie Smith Ferguson, instructor.

The work is entirely voluntarily on the part of the student, each student obtaining the written consent of his parent before they are enrolled in the classes.

One of Springfield's best known citizens, Mrs. Mary Clarissa Magill, passed away at her home here Sunday at the age of 74 years. She had been ill for many months.

Mrs. Magill was born at Clarksville, Iowa on June 16, 1860. On December 16, 1879 Miss Mary C. Phillippi was married to John Magill at Clarksville.

They remained in Clarksville until 1886 when they came to Oregon locating at Coburg for 13 years before coming to Springfield where she has lived continuously. Mr. Magill died on November 25, 1912.

Four children, Lloyd H. Magill of Bend, Mrs. Luella Lester of Portland, Mrs. Estella Findley and Mrs. Mammie Richmond, both of Springfield survive. She also leaves three brothers, Wallace Phillippi, Walla Walla, Washington; Stephen Phillippi, Scio, Oregon; and Albert Phillippi, Arlington, Oregon.

She was a member of the Methodist church and of Juanita Rebekah lodge, Cascade Chapter O. E. S., and Pine Circle, Neighbors of Woodcraft.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 from the Methodist church with Rev. Dean C. Poindexter officiating. Interment was made in Laurel hill cemetery by the Springfield chapel of Poole funeral home.

ELECT TWO NEW TOWN OFFICERS

Aldrich Chosen Recorder And Paul Potter Appointed As Treasurer At Meeting

PETERSON RESIGNS JOB Recorder For Last Eight Years Buys Law Practice In Junction City

Chester Aldrich is the new city recorder and Paul F. Potter is the new treasurer of Springfield. The new officers were elected at a special meeting of the council Wednesday evening after the resignation of Recorder Ira M. Peterson had been received and accepted.

Mr. Aldrich elected city treasurer at the general election, was chosen to take Mr. Peterson's place leaving a vacancy in the office of treasurer.

Leaves Appointments To Council

The appointment of the two new officials will be to fill out the unexpired terms of the officers resigned. They will take office February 25. On calling the council together Mayor E. H. Turner said that he understood it was his privilege to appoint the new officials but that he preferred to have the nominations made by the council. After nominations had been made all councilmen voted for ratification of both new officers.

Councilmen expressed themselves as well pleased with the new appointees. Mr. Aldrich they said had proven at last election that he had strong support in the community. Mr. Potter has been raised in Springfield being educated in our public schools and the University of Oregon. Both being young men with their future ahead of them belief was expressed they would render the city a high type of service.

Peterson To Move

Mr. Peterson, who announced his resignation earlier in the week, has been recorder for eight years under four mayors. After making his announcement that he expected to resign as recorder he states he has purchased the law practice of Douglas Harris in Junction City and expects to take up his duties there shortly after March 1. He will move his family there as soon as his affairs here will permit his leaving the city. Mr. Peterson expressed himself as being well pleased with his new field at Junction City and said that it was one he had been trying to get into for some time.

Letter Points To Discard

The following is a copy of Mr. Peterson's resignation read to the council Wednesday evening by City Attorney James K. King:

Feb. 20th, 1935. To the Mayor and Common Council of Springfield:

Since the present Mayor and Council assumed office, their attitude towards me as Recorder, with the exception of Mr. Taylor, has for the most part been antagonistic and critical. This attitude has been persisted in to such an extent that it has destroyed my usefulness to the city and I can be of no further service. There is nothing left for me to do but resign which I now do to become effective as of March 1st, 1935.

When I was first persuaded to run for Recorder in 1926, I had no idea that I would continue this long. I have been elected Recorder for five consecutive terms, serving for more than eight years, and also serving for nearly nine years as City Attorney. A California sheriff, after forty years in office, recently retired saying that political office is but a temporary job at best. I have a very good friend who has served for the past twenty-five years in public office and who has told me that it is all a mistake and that if he had it to do over, he would follow a different course. I am still a young man with time yet to accomplish something worth while in my chosen profession.

The people of Springfield have been very kind, generous and loyal to me during my years of service to them and I shall ever hold in my heart a very warm spot for these people. I have served as Recorder perhaps longer than any other during the history of our town and during a period of extreme financial stress and trial. The duties of the office have been burdensome. It is some relief to be rid of them. My association during this time with Councilmen and City Officials has for the most part been pleasant. Two Mayors died in office during my tenure, C. O. Wilson and W. P. Tyson. These men deserve a lasting place in the memory of our people. I shall ever hold in grateful memory my association with them.

In closing my work as City Recorder, I have the satisfaction of consciousness of duty well performed. Yours truly, I. M. PETERSON, Recorder, Springfield, Oregon.
