URGE FARMERS TO RUSH APPLICATIONS FOR LOAN Farmers seeking emergency land bank "commissioner" loans to refinance their outstanding indebtedness are advised by the Land bank to make all possible haste.

While the "deadline" on commissioner loan applications does not close until February 1, 1935, the special fund provided by congress for these emergency real estate loans is being used up rapidly.

Nearly 3000 commissioner and regular type Land bank applications have been approved for approximately \$12,650,000 but are still awaiting final action on the part of the applicants. In many cases closing is delayed because of the inability of farmers to get their creditors to accept the amount which the Land bank has approved based on the "normal valuation" or debt paying ability of the property.

Voluntary county debt adjustment committees are giving valuable assistance in these instances, bringing debtors and creditors together to discuss the situation.

Land bank loan applications must be completed before May 1, 1935, in order for the borrower to have the privilege of deferring payments on the principal portion of his installments (provided his mortgage is not otherwise in default) until 1938. For the same period of time, until 1938, the interest rate on Land bank loans is reduced to 4% per cent on loans coming through national farm loan associations and 5 per cent on those coming direct to the bank without local association indorsement.

MARCH 16 FINAL CORN-HOG DATE

Farmers Signing Up Nearly 100 Per Cent; Controlled Expansion Is Aim

March 16 has been set as the closing date for signing applications for the 1935 corn-hog contracts by the Oregon board of review which held its first meeting recently. This date is somewhat earlier than that set last year, but as there is little work to renewing the contracts it was felt that first payments would be speeded up and the best interests of all be served by completing the campaign promptly.

Farmers who understand the 1935 contracts are signing up nearly 100 per cent, according to reports to the extension service by those assisting with field meetings. In a series of meetings in central and southern Oregon every grower attending signed up again with the exception of one.

Want to Control Expansion Considerable misunderstanding concerning the new provisions exists and is keeping many away from the sign-up meetings, reports indicate. Many believe that further reduction below the number of hogs produced for market in 1934 is required in the new contracts, when just the opposite is true.

The 1935 contracts really call for "controlled expansion" as the grower may produce 15 per cent more of his established hog base than was allowed last year. In other words he is permitted to produce and market up to 90 per cent of his base instead of 75 per cent.

Furthermore, because of excessively low production in some counties last year, some growers could double their hog production of last year and still stay within the contract limits and collect the benefit payments at the rate of \$15 per head for the number represented by the 10 per cent reduction.

Other liberal features this year include permission to purchase and raise as many feeder pigs as desired, removal of limit on total crop acreage or livestock numbers, and in the case of corn contracts, permission to grow anything but corn on the contracted or "shifted" acres.

NEW PASTOR STOPS FOR VISIT HERE TUESDAY

Rev. I. G. Shaw, recently called to serve the Springfield Christian church, was in Springfield Tuesday afternoon meeting members of the local church and investigating living quarters. He stopped here enroute home from San Francisco via Klamath Falls. He has been conducting evangelistic services in the Middle West recently.

The new pastor will preach his first sermon and officially assume his church pastorate here on Sunday, March 3. It has been announced. In the interim, Rev. Clifton A. Phillips will act as pulpit supply.
