The new system is expected to be more proficient as well as less expensive than the one-man paid department now serving the

Ten or twelve trained men with some alternates will compose the new department. A number of men who wished to join were at last nights meeting and there are a number of others who will apply. it was reported. Volunteers will be paid for each fire they help fight.
